Let's honor unsung Black veterans Paul E. Dillard, National Commander FEB 02, 2022

Dear American Legion Family Members and Friends,

There are many honorable veterans whose contributions to freedom, democracy and our American way of life are lost in history. And there are various reasons for these slights, some unintended, while others can be traced back to how society operated back in those days.

Sharing the stories of these courageous men and women helps educate fellow veterans, the general public and those who will study and revere them for generations to come.

With Black History Month underway, this is a perfect time to pay tribute to our comrades who may not have received the just recognition they richly deserved.

While Dorie Miller's World War II heroics have been well documented, he has unfortunately not received the Medal of Honor posthumously. However, there are eight American Legion posts that bear his name. In fact, <u>two of them joined forces to</u> <u>honor Miller recently</u> in Waco, Texas.

An often-overlooked story is that of Charles W. David Jr., a Black Coast Guard petty officer who risked his life to help save 93 survivors after a German torpedo struck the USS *Dorchester* in the north Atlantic on Feb. 3, 1943 – and may have been a divine answer to the Four Chaplains' prayers. <u>In a Q&A</u> <u>about his book "The Immortals: The World War II Story of Five Fearless Heroes, the Sinking of the *Dorchester*, and an Awe-inspiring Res-<u>cue</u>," author Steven Collis shares the story of David's heroics.</u>

Additionally, did you know a group of Army officers and Buffalo Soldiers rode their bicycles for about 1,900 miles to test whether they would suffice for military transportation? Learn more about this amazing adventure from Buffalo Soldier descendant, American Legion member, and re-enactor Bobby McDonald. He will be among those leading this summer's <u>quasquicentennial</u> commemorations of the Iron Riders' historic trek.

There are so many more stories of unsung Black veterans out there. Some are explored in <u>this</u> <u>week's episode</u> of The American Legion Tango Alpha Lima podcast. The Iron Riders are featured in the February issue of *The American Legion Magazine*.

Whether you read, listen to, or watch these stories of patriotism, sacrifice, and honor, I'm sure you will be grateful as I am for their commitments to keeping America safe.

Answer to the Four Chaplains' prayers By Matt Grills | FEB 01, 2022

The week of Feb. 3, American Legion posts across the country will observe Four Chaplains Day, named for four Army chaplains – George L. Fox (Methodist), Alexander D. Goode (Jewish), Clark V. Poling (Reformed), and John P. Washington (Catholic) – who gave up their life jackets so others would live after a U-boat torpedoed their transport in the North Atlantic on Feb. 3, 1943.

In his 2021 book <u>"The Immortals,"</u> Steven Collis offers a detailed narrative of *Dorchester*'s sinking, the chaplains' sacrifice and, for the first time in print, the full story of Charles W. David Jr., the young Black Coast Guard petty officer who, with his shipmates on the escort cutter *Comanche*, helped rescue 93 of 227 survivors. He died from pneumonia a month later, and was posthumously awarded the Navy & Marine Corps Medal for heroism. In 2013, the Coast Guard named a *Sentinel*-class cutter for David.

Tell me about the first time you heard the story of the Four Chaplains. The first time I heard it I was in the office of an attorney who worked on religious freedom matters. He had on his wall a framed copy of the stamp that had been made to honor the Four Chaplains, and he talked about it as a high point in his mind for religious freedom in the United States - people of different beliefs still being able to stay true to who they are but come together for a common good. As I looked at the stamp, I thought it was such a compelling story, and my immediate thought was, "I would love to bring this to life for a new generation." Not too many years later, when I had an opportunity to put a book proposal together, it was top of mind for me.

What about the story resonates with you? I am a scholar of religious freedom law, that's what I do professionally, and I was originally working on a book trying to explain religious freedom law more generally to a lay audience. I wanted to include the story in that book because it really does show what makes America unique. We're the most religiously and racially diverse country in the history of the world and yet we're somehow able to live alongside one another in peace. That peace is unique. It's unique historically and it's unique in the world today. And we're able to achieve it largely because of the attitude that the Four Chaplains showed that night, and not even just that night but how they lived their lives serving men prior to their sacrifice. I felt like it was an example that all of us, especially today, could learn from and be trying to emulate more.

There are other books and many websites that tell the story of the Four Chaplains.

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What were the challenges in trying to do **something new?** The biggest challenge was not being too repetitive and also telling it in my own words. I had read everything else written about the chaplains, and I felt like I could tell it in a little bit more of an engaging narrative style. Two, the last book that had been written was in the early 2000's. Books get forgotten, so it was time to revive this story for a new generation. The other goal I set was to try to stick to original sources as much as possible, so I spent days in the (American) Jewish Archives for Alex Goode and then the National Archives and getting my hands on all the official reports, and the journal of the submarine captain ... so I could tell the story from the original sources and not simply reframe it the way someone else had told it before.

The big contribution was bringing to life Charles David Jr. No one had really ever told his story. I was well into my research and well into the book before I found him. The most treatment he had gotten was a couple of paragraphs in another book, and that was it. I thought to myself, "This man made as much of a sacrifice as all the chaplains, and he deserves as much of the treatment." I was at my deadline to get the book published, and I called my editor and said, "Hey, I found this guy. I need you to extend my deadline, get me time to hunt down his family, find out everything I can about him. We need to change the name of the book." We were going to call it "The Immortal Chaplains." I said, "He's not a chaplain. We need to change the name to 'The Immortals." Thankfully, my editor was completely on board with that, and Charles David's family was on board with it.

What surprised you in your research on **Charles David's life?** One thing I thought was really fascinating was that Charles' family comes from the Caribbean. They emigrated to the United States with a lot of people during the early 1900's and ended up settling in New York City. His father helped build pews for a local church and was a craftsman, and Charles learned those skills. When he opted to enter the military, it was just so different than it is now: there was blatant racial segregation. The only place he could find a position was in the Coast Guard, and in that scenario, the only thing he could really be was a cook or a petty officer. He's basically been told despite his skills and his natural abilities that he can only progress so far because of the color of his skin. That's the world they were living in in the 1940's. He was the fifth lowest-ranked man aboard (Comanche) the night Dorchester was sunk, and he had zero obligation to jump into the water and help anybody. Everyone above him should have been doing it, but a lot of people figuratively froze because they were afraid of literally freezing, and they had a hard time jumping into the water. So (David) and a number of the officers jumped in. (He) easily could have said, "It's not my job. I'm going to go down below and heat up some coffee for people." In fact, he was in the water again and again trying to save people.

You describe David's actions as an answer to the chaplains' prayers. That idea came to me from his granddaughter, whom I interviewed at length. She mentioned to me in passing one time, "You know, I always felt that while the chaplains were on that boat praying that God sent my grandfather as an answer to those prayers." I thought, "What a compelling way of thinking about this," and included it in the book. You have four men of different faiths all praying in their own way to God to ask him for help for these men they have sacrificed for, and then you have this very unlikely hero coming and sacrificing himself to save as many of those men as he could. About half the survivors were saved by Charles and the other folks aboard Comanche. Their sacrifice - and his sacrifice in particular, he was the one who died – is really dramatic.

You've gotten to know David's descendants. What's it meant to them to share his story? He's been a tremendous source of inspiration for them, and their family has seen generations of success, following in his footsteps. There's been professors and accountants and law enforcement officers and military personnel and revolutionaries. When he got the award from the Coast Guard, there was a reporter interviewing his widow, and two of her brothers were there. Both of them were talking about how they would love to serve in the military and that they wouldn't be hesitant to do so. A year after it happened, you can already see his example spilling into the next generation. He's still someone in their family they're rightly proud of, as are the families of the chaplains.

Next year is the 80th anniversary of *Dorchester*'s sinking. Why is the story of the Four Chaplains and Charles David Jr. one we need to hear again? We have the most diverse country – religiously, racially, ethnically – of any country in the world. That diversity can be a huge strength for us, or it can be something we let tear us apart. I think the story of the chaplains and of Charles David Jr. is that we don't have to let it tear us apart. We can keep those parts of ourselves that are unique to us and not abandon them while also living alongside one another in peace and love while working toward a common goal. I think it's something we have to constantly relearn in the country; otherwise, it's going to be very easy to just engage in tribalism and tear ourselves apart. I personally feel like we see that today in the United States. There's lots of division, there's partisanship, lots of distrust. We have to get back, I think, to more of the mindset of what these brave men showed. My hope is that more and more people see that story and try to have that same attitude and spirit as they go about their daily lives and their political and public lives.



Friday's national membership report shows the Central Region holding on to first place by the slimmest of margins. We are at 74.25% with the Eastern Region on our tails coming in at 73.93%. Congratulations to the East for surpassing the 100,000 members paid mark. Keep up your awesome work.

As we see every year, there was an influx of membership transmitted in the first few weeks of the



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year. Members wait to pay their dues until January every year, and Squadrons see an increase in members paid. Unfortunately, our organization still has 95,112 unpaid members. In the Central Region, that number is 32,176 representing 74.25% paid.

On Wednesday we have a national target date of 75%, and I am confident that our Region will hit that mark. As of today, we have five Detachments that have reached and exceeded that 75% goal. Congratulations to the Detachments of Wisconsin, Iowa, Michigan, Illinois, and Ohio. Missouri, Minnesota, and Indiana are all above 70%.

We are the only region in the organization to have all of its Detachments above the 70% mark. No other region is even close to this accomplishment, and every Central Region member should be proud of this feat. But we are not even close to being done.

Today we need to reach out to our unpaid members and see what we can do to help. A friend once said that his Detachment doesn't really push membership very hard because the programs in that state are so good that members want to pay on time. That Detachment is above the next target date, and must be doing something right. Let's all try that over the next few weeks.

If you are having a Super Bowl party, Daytona 500 party, Valentine's Day dinner, or anything else including just enjoying camaraderie around the canteen, talk about membership, ask members to pay and get back in good standing, and continue our recruiting efforts.

Let's make sure we hold as well as increase our lead in the Central Region. Let's make sure we don't lag over the next few weeks. Let's continuing honoring the veterans who made us eligible by staying current with our dues. If you have not paid, please stop reading and contact your Membership Chairman or Adjutant get paid today.

As we move closer to Spring, we must all be thinking about submitting our three mandatory documents. The Consolidated Squadron Report, the Officer Certification Form, and the Squadron Data Report are due every year. Some states will not send out membership cards to Squadrons without these annual mandatory reports.

If you have any questions about reporting, need help with the forms, or don't know the deadlines in your Detachment, please contact your Detachment Headquarters. They are here to help you, and they will.

These documents are vital, and we need to reach a minimum of 50% submissions on the CSR and 100% submissions on the OCF and SDR. *Who's next?*

Belleville Sons of The American Legion donates to Fisher House

As one of its major 'adopted' charities, Sons of The American Legion (SAL) Squadron 105 in Belleville, made a \$1,750 donation in January to the Fisher House Foundation. The money was raised through a 50/50 held by Squadron 105 in December, a matching donation from the Squadron itself, and a personal donation by Squadron Commander Steve Sangemino. "At Squadron 105, we're always very pleased to donate to such a worthy organization. What they have done, and what they continue do for veterans, is amazing," stated Adjutant Rusty Myers, who cut the check to the Fisher House Foundation from 105.

This is the third year that SAL 105 has donated to the Fisher House Foundation. In line with the Sons of The American Legion's "Four Pillars," one of which is focusing on caring for veterans and their families, 105 is proud to make this one of our most valued contributions each year.

The Fisher House Foundation builds comfort homes where military and veteran's families can stay free of charge, while a loved one is in the hospital. These homes are located at military and VA medical centers around the world. Fisher Houses have up to 21 suites, with private bedrooms and baths. Families share a common kitchen, laundry facilities, a warm dining room and an inviting living room. Since inception, the program has saved military and veterans' families an estimated \$451 million in out-of-pocket costs for lodging and transportation. It is in this way that a veteran can be surrounded by his family during perhaps some of the most difficult times in their lives.

"It's a good program," stated SAL Commander Sangemino at the Squadron's meeting in January. "For what we've done here [Belleville], it's [also] good to move on and help other people."

This 50/50 is usually held between Thanksgivings through the holiday season. This year, the winning ticket was picked at Post 105's New Year's Eve party, with the winning ticket being that of the SAL 105 Commander, Steve Sangemino. The raffle netted \$750 going to the organization, which was matched by a unanimous vote from SAL 105. In that same vote, the Sons decided on making Fisher House an adopted charity, donating to them in perpetuity. The \$1,500 donation was then added to by a personal donation from Commander Steve, bringing it up to a total of \$1,750.

VA Health-care Modernization

The future of VA health care is as a hybrid system consisting of VHA-provided inpatient and outpatient care, telehealth and community care. Ensuring VA is equipped to meet the unique needs of an increasingly diverse veteran population requires that VA fully leverage all health-care modalities and ensure a seamless transition between them. Modernizing electronic health records, veterancentric access standards and a transparent online scheduling system for both VHA-provided care and community care is essential to ensuring our veterans receive the care they deserve. The means by which VA delivers care may change, but one thing will not. VA should continue to deliver the best care anywhere to our nation's veterans.

Suicide Prevention & Peer Support

Several studies have shown that peer support is beneficial for people who are experiencing mental health issues or are making the transition back to civilian life. The American Legion has its own peersupport program known as the "Buddy Check" which encourages outreach and veteran peer-to-peer engagement. The American Legion urges Congress to pass legislation requiring VA to establish a national Buddy Check Week to encourage veterans to reach out to those with whom they served. The American Legion also encourages legislation to establish a peersupport program that would offer grants to place peer-support specialists in local posts of veterans service organizations.

The American Legion urges Congress to diligently oversee implementation of recently passed VA pilot programs, research initiatives, and policy revisions to address this issue. Additionally, The American Legion encourages expansion of child and newborn care services at VA.

Currently, 42,000 military retirees with combat-related injuries qualify for retirement pay for their service from DoD, and compensation for service-connected disabilities from VA. However, for retired veterans with disability ratings less than 50%, their VA compensation is deducted from their DoD retirement pay. The American Legion strongly supports ending this unfair policy of forcing

many military retirees to forfeit their retired pay to receive equal amounts of disability compensation. The Major Richard Star Act would repeal this draconian offset, allowing disabled veterans to concurrently receive both their retirement pay and their disability compensation. *S.* 344 - *Major Richard Star Act*

Guard & Reserve GI Bill Parity

National Guard and Reserve servicemembers are being deprived of education benefits that activeduty servicemembers enjoy, despite completing the same duties. According to the law, as it is currently written, National Guard and Reserve servicemembers only accrue GI Bill entitlement when called to active duty under federal orders. When National Guard and Reserve servicemembers are activated under state orders, they do not accrue eligibility for Post 9/11 GI Bill benefits like their active-duty counterparts do. The American Legion believes that every day in uniform counts, and urges Congress to recognize the service of National Guard and Reserve servicemembers as eligible for the GI Bill.

GI Bill for Honorable Service

To receive most VA benefits, a veteran's character of discharge or service must be "under honorable conditions." However,education assistance benefits within the GI Bill have a requirement that servicemembers receive an "honorable discharge." If the character of service is "general under honorable conditions," the Post-9/11 GI Bill remains out of reach for these veterans. The American Legion urges Congress to correct this statutory incongruity by amending U.S. Code to allow access to VA educational assistance to veterans with "general under honorable conditions" discharges.
