We often talk about "The American Legion Family." It's such an important part of how we support our veterans.

The American Legion's National Executive Committee unanimously passed <u>Resolution No. 7</u> last October to create an event called American Legion Family Day. Prompted by a resolution from the Detachment of Maryland that was initially approved by the SAL NEC, this resolution establishes the event to be observed annually on the last Saturday in April, with posts opening their doors to the community and celebrating the accomplishments of Legionnaires, Sons, and members of the American Legion Auxiliary.

The resolution also calls on the Legion Family to use the day to promote **BE III ONE**. The terrible impact a veteran's suicide can have on his or her family is devastating.

That's why I encourage you to not only participate in your post's American Legion Family Day event, but to use the event to "Be The One." Share with the community why the program is so important and how your squadron and post are helping reduce and eliminate veteran suicide.

How to make Buddy Check wristbands for public awareness

The American Legion | February 16, 2023

American Legion Buddy Checks are to be conducted during the week of the Legion's birthday per Resolution 18. <u>Download the Buddy Check Toolkit</u> to help you connect with Legionnaires and veterans in your community.

The American Legion Department of Oregon has also created an engaging tool to help you prepare for and promote Buddy Checks, as well as Be the One.

The Department of Oregon created colorful wristbands to educate the public on the Legion's Buddy Check program and Be the One suicide prevention awareness initiative and to give them something they can wear daily as a reminder.

Two wristbands are in 4x6 Ziplock bags with a cardstock insert educating on Buddy Checks or Be the One.

"We went with two bracelets per pack to create the opportunity of engagement," said Department 1st Vice Commander Cory Brockmann. "You can pull one out and wear it and give the other to someone else. So wear it and share it."

The Buddy Check packets feature a variety of slipknot wristband colors – yellow, red, white, black, orange, blue, red, pink, green, hunter green, etc. While the Be the One wristband is silicone, red and blue, and has the American

Legion brandmark, Be the One website and "Save a veteran" embossed on it.

To date, nearly 4,000 Buddy Check packets have been made and 8,000 slipknot wristbands.

How to make slipknot bracelets

- Watch YouTube videos. Brockmann searched "How to make slipknot bracelets" on YouTube and about 20, three-minute videos popped up. He then went to a sporting goods store and bought cord used for lacrosse rackets. He cut it into 18-inch lengths and practiced in front of his computer while watching the YouTube videos.
- Purchase string. Lacrosse net strings work or Brockmann found wholesalers (to make it cost effective) and bought spools of 300-foot paracord in a variety of colors that were on sale.
- Purchase white cardstock for the inserts. Brockmann lays three out on a single sheet.
- Identify funding. The Department of Oregon American Legion Foundation provided grants to cover the cost of the Buddy Check and Be the One wristbands. For about 3,000 Buddy Check packs it was \$1,000; and around \$1,200 for 5,000 Be the One silicone bracelets. "The beauty of this is that is scalable. You don't have to have a grant for \$1,000 or \$1,500 and go all in. I would encourage folks to develop your design based on what your intended target is. Then grow it from there."
- Make the wristbands. Brockmann said it's been all volunteer work to make the slipknot wristbands that has included the whole Legion Family and Legion Baseball players. "It's labor intensive, but it's a great opportunity for relationships with the foundation and American Legion Family."

Card inserts

- FRONT: Buddy Check
- Our Mission: No veteran left behind. It's that simple.
 Because one is one too many.
- BACK: Please wear and share these slipknot bracelets as a reminder of the sacrifices made by veterans and our military servicemembers And as a symbol of the bond that unites us together, as one. American
- Together, we can prevent veteran suicide.

The back also features the Veterans Crisis Line phone number and website for more resources, and donation information to the department's foundation to support suicide prevention efforts.

- FRONT: Be the One logo
- BACK 1: The American Legion's mission is to reduce the rate of veteran suicide by empowering veterans, servicemembers, their loved ones and anyone else to take action to save the life of one veteran when the need arises.
- BACK 2: Wear or share this bracelet as a reminder of the sacrifices made by veterans, servicemembers and their families. It is a symbol of the bond that unites veterans and civilians together as Americans.
- Together, we can all act to reduce the number of veteran suicides. Be the One.


Find opportunities of engagement

The Department of Oregon has left Be the One packets at VA hospitals and on a table, they sponsored at a veterans memorial fundraiser. They too handed out more than 800 Buddy Check packets to fans at a Portland Trail Blazers game.

"Be the One outreach is good for the public because the solution to ending veteran suicide isn't just talking to veterans," Brockmann said. "It's talking to family members of veterans; it's talking to the public ... identifying with those that are friends with veterans. It's going to take all of us to bring an end to veteran suicide."

Brockmann added that you don't have to live in a large metropolitan area to be successful in engaging. "The more events that bring engagement are smaller events." You can create these packets for delivery at blood drives, farmers markets, fairs, parades, and other community events.

"Successes can happen everywhere. There really are no failures. The key failure would be the one where you don't take action. One step at a time; start small and build it."



Welcome to The American Legion's Hill Visit Toolkit. This page is dedicated to providing American Legion Family members with current, easy-to-use tools for participating in grassroots advocacy. Below are resources for Legion Family members to assist in becoming effective grassroots advocates.

The American Legion is a grassroots organization at its core. As such, the support of members is critical as we advocate on behalf of all veterans in the halls of Congress. The most effective way to support The American Legion's legislative agenda is communication – by individuals in their local posts expressing their views on specific bills. Emails, telephone calls, Legislative Alerts and personal letters from constituents have a powerful influence on members of Congress. They want to hear from you so they can gauge public opinion on specific issues.

Tools For Legionnaires, Find Your Congressional Representatives. You can find your elected representatives at our <u>Grassroots Action Center</u>. This can be found in the bottom right corner of the page.

Contact Your Congressional Representatives. You can contact your representative through our campaigns located on our <u>Grassroots Action Center</u>. Be sure to share The American Legion's legislative priorities using the Legislative Agenda when you contact their office. While on the Grassroots Action Center page, be sure to sign up for our legislative alerts so you can stay up to date on all of The American Legion's legislative campaigns.

You can also contact your representative in a variety of ways including in-person meetings, virtual meetings, phone calls, emails and through social media.

Afterward, you can fill out a <u>congressional contact report</u> form after you contact your congressional office. This will allow the national Legislative staff to know that the meeting took place and make staff members aware of any follow-up actions to take with the representative or their staff.

Tools for Legislative Council Members. All members of the Legislative Council are expected to contact their assigned representatives. Congress is open to in-person meetings, and you can also use a number of digital platforms. Below are the three methods listed in order of effectiveness. The preferred method is to schedule a meeting or phone call.

Methods to Contact Your Assigned Representative

 Schedule a meeting. Congress is now open to visitors, meaning legislators and their staff may now physically meet with people. A 15- to 30-minute meeting with your legislator's office will give you an opportunity to delve into a deeper conversation about <u>the Legion's Legislative Agenda</u>.

- Call your legislator. You may also call your representative's office and ask to speak with the staffer who handles the veteran and/or military portfolio. You can also ask for an email address if a phone number is not provided.
- Send an email. Congressional staff are closely monitoring office emails and will note the issues most prevalent in their district.

What You Should Speak About. Review The American Legion's legislative priorities using the Legislative Agenda and the point papers. This will give you a clear understanding of the issues and The American Legion's recommended solutions to the problem.

After the Meeting. Please be sure to fill out a <u>congressional</u> <u>contact report form</u> after you contact your congressional office. This will allow the national Legislative staff to know that the meeting took place and make staff members aware of any follow-up actions to take with the representative or their staff.

Sons raise money for Fisher House

BELLEVILLE, NJ – For the fourth year in a row, Sons of the American Legion (SAL) Squadron 105 in Belleville, NJ ran a fundraiser resulting in the donation of \$2,500 to the Fisher House Foundation, a series of comfort homes at VA hospitals for veterans and their families. \$1,250 of that donation was then also matched by corporate donor Signia. This year's program was more impactful to the Sons then previous years as they actually had an opportunity to visit a Fisher House in New York City.

Sons from Belleville took a trip in early February to make a portion of the donation in person to the Fisher House located at the John J. Peters VA Medical Center in the Bronx, while also getting a tour of the facility. "I was blown away by today, I really was," was the response from SAL 105 Commander Steve Sangemino after the visit.

Round-Up

The Fisher House Foundation builds comfort homes where military & veteran's families can stay free of charge, while a loved one is in the hospital. These homes are located at military and VA medical centers around the world. Fisher Houses have up to 21 suites, with private bedrooms and baths. Families share a common kitchen, laundry facilities, a warm dining room, and an inviting living room. Since inception, the program has saved military and veterans' families an estimated \$451 million in out-of-pocket costs for lodging and transportation. It is in this way that a veteran can be surrounded by his family during perhaps some of the most difficult times in their lives. Currently, the Foundation is building its 100th house in Atlanta.

A Fisher House is built by the foundation using private funds, then gifted to the federal Secretary of the Department of Veteran's Affairs (VA). These facilities are actually built on VA property, and are available to the veteran and their family for as long as they are getting care, at no cost – so their stay can range from a few days, to weeks, to months.

The donation from SAL 105 was raised in a 50/50 raffle held in November and December in 2022, as Squadron 105 has done every year since 2019. This year, the SAL originally printed 400 tickets, which were sold in three days. Another 200 were printed by Thanksgiving, being sold out as well ... which netted a donation of \$1,500. At a meeting in January, the squadron then voted to add \$1,000 on top of what was raised through the 50/50, making the total donation \$2,500.

SAL 105 Adjutant Rusty Myers noted that "This is what the money is here for – for it to be put to work for our veterans." New member Ron Planer, who joined in December, echoed that sentiment – "I'm proud we can contribute in any way we can." He earlier commented when at the Fisher House that "...this is exactly why I joined this [the SAL]. This is wonderful ... this is what it's all about."

As previous donors, SAL 105 receives periodic emails from Fisher House. One such email came in late December titled "Double your donation TODAY!" As has happened in the past, if the squadron made a donation right then and there online it would be matched – so members of the 105 Executive Board made a decision to make part of the donation before the raffle was pulled. The email went on, "Help us end this year with a big impact! Our friends at Signia are matching \$25,000 in donations today, helping countless families stay in Fisher Houses around the world." Signia, producing one of the leading hearing aid brands in the world, matched \$1,250 of the Belleville SAL's donation.

The SAL has never actually been to a Fisher House, though they have done a number of donations over the years exceeding \$7,000.

A portion of the donation was made in person to Belleville's nearest Fisher House, which is located in the Bronx. House Manager Ellen Trbovich was kind and generous enough to arrange a tour and coffee afterward. She noted that "If it wasn't for the VSO's [Veterans Service Organizations]... your donations are greatly appreciated and will go a long way to help the families here. This all helps the veteran in the hospital, so they don't have to worry about their family."

The crew from 105 toured the entire house on the campus of James J. Peters VA Center, of which there are two. As a press release about the dedication of the two houses when they were built in 2019 states, "A Fisher House creates an instant community for its residents, united by their common mission of supporting a sick or injured loved one, but also provides each individual with a secure and private refuge after a long day at the hospital to rest and recharge." The accommodations for the 32 families are just that – clean, serene, private, and with all of the comforts of home. Those visiting the house that day remarked on how quiet the house was inside, despite being in the center of the Bronx. These two houses were the 82nd and 83 houses built.

Michael Vahoviak, Assistant Manager, added while chatting over coffee what a big impact these donations have on how the house is operated ... "all of the donations – 100% of them – go to these families. Especially important for those who can't afford it." The 105 group spent an hour just talking with staff members Ellen and Michael, who were not only very inviting but quite passionate about the VA and the Fisher House Foundation. They also were kind enough to take a


group photo before the trip back across the bridge. On the car ride home, the attendees couldn't stop talking about how much they enjoyed the trip and what a learning experience it was.

After returning home, the group recounted the experience to Post 105's Walter LaBar, an Air Force veteran and the Legion's 1st Vice Commander. He stated perfectly that "...it sounds like another name for the Fisher House should be the 'Dream House,' because it's a dream-come- true for those who need it."

Legion Baseball alumni to represent U.S. in World Baseball Classic

Two former American Legion Baseball players are part of Team USA in the World Baseball Classic coming up in March.

Catcher J.T. Realmuto (Post 170/Midwest City, Okla.) and pitcher Daniel Bard (Post 337/Pineville, N.C.) are among the 30 players representing the United States in the tournament, taking place for the first time since 2017 after being canceled in 2021 due to the pandemic.

The Americans won the fourth World Baseball Classic, in 2017. Japan won the inaugural tournament in 2006 and repeated in 2009, with the Dominican Republic winning the title in 2013.

The 2023 tournament will consist of 20 teams divided into four pools. Team USA is in Pool C with Mexico, Colombia, Canada, and Great Britain, and will play their pool games in Phoenix from March 11–15.

The other pools:

Pool A, in Taichung, Taiwan, March 8-12: Chinese Taipei, Netherlands, Cuba, Italy and Panama.

Pool B, in Tokyo, March 9-13: Japan, Korea, Australia, China and Czech Republic.

Pool D, in Miami, March 11-15: Puerto Rico, Venezuela, Dominican Republic, Israel and Nicaragua.

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Pool play will be a round-robin, double-elimination tournament, with the top two finishers in each pool advancing. The winners and runners-up from Pools A and B will meet in single-elimination quarterfinal play March 15-16 in Tokyo, while teams advancing from Pools C and D will play quarterfinal games March 17-18 in Miami. The semifinals are scheduled for March 19-20 in Miami, with the championship game March 21 in Miami.

Team USA's pool play schedule:

- March 11: vs. Great Britain, 7 p.m. MT, Fox.
- March 12: vs. Mexico, 7 p.m. MT, FS1.
- March 13: vs. Canada, 7 p.m. MT, FS1.
- March 15: vs. Colombia, 7 p.m. MT, FS1.

Deaths among active-duty troops from fentanyl overdoses rise sharply, Pentagon says

Fentanyl was involved in 88% of the deaths of service members who overdosed on illicit drugs in 2021, a steep increase in five years, according to Defense Department data provided to Congress.

"Our military is not immune to the opioid epidemic," Sen. Edward Markey, D-Mass., said in a statement Wednesday. "The Department of Defense's latest report underscores the urgency of this moment and our need to ensure access to quality care and treatment without stigma or shame."

Five years ago, the synthetic drug was involved in 36% of troop overdose deaths, according to Pentagon data.

Markey and other senators requested data on overdoses from the Defense Department in September and last week received 12 pages from Pentagon officials that included statistics and prevention efforts.

From 2017 to 2021, 15,293 service members overdosed on drugs and alcohol and 332 died. More than half of those

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who died had taken fentanyl, a synthetic opioid that is more potent than morphine, the report found.

Fentanyl, an approved pain medication being produced and sold illegally, is killing about 70,000 Americans each year, President Joe Biden said earlier this month in his State of the Union speech.

Increasingly, fentanyl is mixed with other illicit drugs or used to replace another drug entirely so that users are expecting something else, and this has led to a rise in deaths from the drug nationwide, according to the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Military officials determined service members accidentally overdosed in 84% of the deaths. Just 12% of the deaths were thought to be suicides.

"Every drug overdose is a preventable loss of life, and we must work to do better," Under Secretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness Gilbert Cisneros wrote in his letter to senators. "The department continues to evaluate, refine, and improve strategies for overdose prevention to ensure we are making every effort to prevent these tragic deaths."

About 10% of those who died had previously failed a drug test administered through their service, the Defense Department said.

The Army, which is the largest of the service branches, saw the most overdose deaths during the five-year period, with a slight decrease from 36 deaths in 2017 to 35 in 2021, according to the Defense Department.

However, the Navy and Marine Corps saw the number of deaths in each service double. Eleven sailors died in 2017 and 21 died in 2021. The Marines lost five sailors in 2017 and 10 in 2021.

The Air Force saw overdose deaths increase from nine to 11. The senators requested the data after reading a story in the September issue of Rolling Stone magazine that raised concerns about overdose deaths among soldiers at Fort Bragg, N.C.

Fort Bragg lost 31 soldiers in five years to overdoses, the highest of any installation mentioned in the Pentagon report.

The Defense Department told senators that the rate of overdose deaths during the five-year period is higher in North Carolina than anywhere else -36 deaths per 100,000

active-duty service members. Washington state had the next highest rate of 29.5 deaths per 100,000 troops, followed by Texas with 28.6.

Cisneros told senators that the Pentagon's effort to prevent overdose deaths are "focused on integrating all drug-related data, including fatal and non-fatal drug overdoses, to ensure timely data monitoring and improve coordination, messaging, treatment intervention and promote readiness."

Most historians agree that family was a high priority for President Lincoln, which made the American Legion Family's expanded role in the 89th annual pilgrimage for the nation's 16th president particularly significant.

"The keynote speaker at our reception is Sons of The American Legion National Commander Christopher Carlton. The keynote speaker at our breakfast is American Legion Auxiliary National President Vickie Koutz and our keynote speaker at the Lincoln Birthday Luncheon is American Legion National Vice Commander Patricia Harris," Past National Commander and current Illinois Department Adjutant Marty Conatser said during the American Legion Family leadership reception Saturday. "We wanted all of our family members to play an important role."

American Legion Post 32 in Springfield, Ill., has led the longest running annual observance held on Lincoln's birthday since 1935. Over the years, national political leaders, state dignitaries, local officials, and American Legion Family members from around the country have gathered at the

president's tomb on Feb. 12 and attended related events conducted by Post 32 and the Department of Illinois.

Alluding to Lincoln's early failed campaigns for political office, Carlton suggested that Americans emulate the president's determination to succeed. "He was defeated many times, but he kept going," Carlton said at his tomb. "He was honest, he was funny, he had a sense of humor. I hope we can all be like Abraham Lincoln and remember that everything is possible in America."

"Lincoln had many great character qualities, but a few of them always stand out when his name is mentioned," Koutz said. "Honesty, empathy, and humility. Lincoln worked for the betterment of others and in the interest of others over self. Does that concept sound familiar? American Legion Auxiliary members answer the call of 'service not self' every day for our nation's heroes and their families. Humility was a strong part of Lincoln and is a strong part of our organization."

Sons of The American Legion Squadron 32 Commander James Peters Jr., served as master of ceremony for the observance at the tomb Sunday morning. "Today we celebrate President Lincoln's birthday and commemorate his central role in building America," Peters said. "President Lincoln and his veterans freed millions from slavery, thus purging an ugly, cruel, and inhumane blot for our national character. Moreover, he preserved our union. Freedom is not free."

Harris said that she believes Lincoln would be pleased to see her speak at his tomb. "One hundred and fifty-eight years after his death, a Black female from the South is representing the largest veterans organization as a national officer at a ceremony honoring his life."

After quoting a passage from the Emancipation Proclamation freeing the slaves, Harris said, "These words codified the famous phrase from the Declaration of Independence that 'All men are created equal.' It is a phrase that is still evolving today – toward women and people of all ethnicities."

Noting that Lincoln had a difficult life that included the loss of close family members, Harris compared his personal struggles with what many veterans face today.

"Too many veterans today are suffering from their own depression," she said. "They feel isolated and alone. Like nobody understands them. This is where The American Legion can step in. We do understand them. We have worn the uniform. Many of us have endured similar experiences. Since 9/11, we have lost nearly triple the veterans to suicide than were lost in battle during the Vietnam War. Some estimates are of 17-per-day, and I have seen estimates of more than 40-per-day. Rather than focus on statistics, let's just focus on one. We all know that one is too many. Let's be the one, to save that one veteran's life."

Due to his service as a member of the Illinois militia, Harris stated that if The American Legion existed during Lincoln's lifetime, the president probably would have joined.

"With full confidence, I believe that if Lincoln were alive today – and eligible, of course – that he would be a proud member of our American Legion Family. Our legacy, after all, is an extension of his legacy."
