Legionnaires to converge on nation's capital to share legislative priorities

The American Legion | February 23, 2023

American Legion National Commander Vincent J. Troiola's testimony before a joint session of the House and Senate Committees on Veterans' Affairs will highlight the 2023 Washington Conference, which will bring Legionnaires from all over the nation and abroad into the nation's capital Feb. 26-March 1.

Troiola will testify March 1 at 10 a.m. about the <u>Legion's top priorities for Congress in 2023</u>, including implementation and oversight of the PACT Act, Department of Veterans Affairs modernization, and mental health and suicide prevention.

On Feb. 26 and 27, various American Legion commissions and committees will meet, hearing from staff from the Department of Veterans Affairs, the Department of Defense, and other organizations and agencies.

The following day, during the Commander's Call, conference attendees will receive briefings from members of Congress, VA staff, the military and Oksana Markarova, the Ukraine ambassador to the United States.

Following the Commander's Call, American Legion Family members will head to Capitol Hill to meet with their representatives and senators, sharing the Legion's top priorities this year for Congress. An employment fair for job-seeking veterans, transitioning servicemembers and military spouses will take place Feb. 28, during which time veterans in need of VA claims assistance will be able to meet with American Legion-accredited service officers.

CALIFORNIA. Sr. Vice Commander Sean Brandon with his committee have come up with a new idea. Bingo. It's a card that you fill out that qualifies your squadron for prizes. I'm sending you the card and the rules. It's definitely a new approach, and hopefully gets our squadrons attention. Both pdf and docx files are included for your perusal.

OFFICIAL RULES FOR "CA SONS MEMBERSHIP 2023 BINGO" CONTEST

Only Squadrons in good standing at the beginning of the membership year are qualified

The size of the Squadron is of no consequence. Benchmarks are based on percentages only, and not raw numbers.

Areas and Districts may create competition amongst themselves, and are encouraged to come up with additional, more local incentives, costs of which to be borne at those levels

The criteria are represented on nine (9) squares, and include the following:

- A) All three (3) mandatory forms being submitted on time (CSO, SDR and CSR) according to instructions on the forms.
- B) The Sr. Vice CDRs two (2) stated goals of 50% of the Squadron's membership goal being met by Veterans Day (11/11/22), and 100% by "tax time" (4/15/23). C) Hitting 102% by 5/15/23.
- D) Hitting 105% by the week prior to convention.
- E) In hitting your overall membership goal percentages, you must have at least 60% retention of 2021 members on your roster, and
- F) 90% retention of your 2022 members.
- G) A letter of certification, signed by the Squadron Commander and/or Adjutant, attesting to the milestones met, must be filed with the "X"d out Bingo card attached. Please write the Squadron number on the back of the Bingo card with ink in at least 1 and 1/2 inch tall numbers. It is the actual Bingo cards, twice folded, that will be randomly and blindly drawn from a container. The certifying Squadron officer must be prepared to substantiate representations made in the letter by copies of dated forms, transmittals, etc. upon request of the Detachment Sr. Vice Commander or his designee. ONLY ONE BINGO CARD PER SQUADRON MAY BE SUBMITTED.
- H) The drawing will be held the week prior to convention (witnessed via Zoom), with the winner(s) announced at the 2023 Detachment convention in Visalia.

Any Squadrons hitting all nine benchmarks will have their Squadron number on their Bingo card entered into a drawing for a big-screen (approx. 48"-50") TV. This prize may be used by the Squadron however they like. For instance, they may award it to their member who recruited the most new members in the year. They could raffle it off at the Squadron/Post level as a fundraiser. They could donate it to their Post to be used in the canteen/home/club facility. They could donate it to another veterans' facility in need, or to a needy or disabled veteran.

If all nine benchmarks are not hit by any Squadrons, we will then go to those hitting the next eight. If none hit eight, then seven and so on. For instance, if at the end of the contest there are no Squadrons qualifying with all nine criteria, but there are four who hit

everything but the 105%, then those four Squadrons will be entered in the drawing. If none hit all eight, but there are eleven that hit seven out of nine, then those eleven will be in the drawing pool.

Consolation Prizes

If there are three or more Squadrons in the drawing pool, two additional Squadron numbers will be drawn for \$100 gift certificates for Emblem Sales.

Suicide survivor extols Be the One message

"This is a topic that is very near and dear to my heart," said Freeman, an Air Force veteran and member of American Legion Post 190 in Ripon, Calif. Freeman, who had previously shared his story on The American Le-

gion Tango Alpha Lima podcast, relayed how a back injury, subsequent fibromyalgia and inability to work led him down a spiral.

"I can say the Legion saved my life," Freeman said during a presentation at a <u>Veterans Campaign Awareness event</u> Feb. 18 in Merced, Calif. "It was 10 years ago next month when I attempted suicide. And in the process of my recovery, I joined the Legion and that's what gave me what I needed in the past 10 years. It gave me purpose. It gave me a mission. Be the One is a fantastic campaign because anyone can 'Be the One."

The American Legion is highlighting the initiative, which aims to reduce the rate of veteran suicide by raising awareness and destignatizing mental health treatment.

Freeman's presentation played a prominent role in the Feb. 17-19 event at American Legion Post 83 in Merced, Calif. The beefed-up revitalization connected veterans with service officers, raised awareness about suicide prevention and more.

Freeman, the California Area 3 vice commander, is the architect of the event. He drew a parallel between his mission and that of Be the One.

"If I can save the life of one veteran with my story, then I've accomplished my goal," he explained. "By telling my story I can get veterans to realize the stigma of mental health treatment is not true. Asking for mental health treatment is not a weakness, it is a strength. If I can get anyone understanding that and getting help, then I have accomplished my goal."

American Legion Department Chaplain Dave Whalen also spoke about Be the One.

"That's what we need," he said, referring to Freeman. "People talking about their experience and educating our comrades. I'm going to talk with you about a topic that is near and dear to my heart, veteran suicide."

Whalen said that in order to make Be the One successful, it takes an entire organizational effort. Posts, districts, and departments are encouraged to conduct events to raise awareness.

"The American Legion says, 'enough talk," Whalen told the audience. "It's time to put boots on the ground. Be the One has been created to start saving veterans' lives. How is The American Legion going to achieve this? By making it OK for veterans to ask for help with mental health issues."

What you can do. Posts, districts, and departments have conducted Buddy Checks, hosted educational symposiums, and pushed out the Be the One message in other ways. There are promotional resources available at the Be the One webpage to assist in these events.

Among them:

- Brochures: There are two trifolds available. One introduces Be the One and can be used to promote an event in your community. The second one, which is intentionally half blank, is intended for posts to customize with local resources and distribute to veterans in their community.
- Videos: There are videos available on the Legion's YouTube playlist. You can also access the Vimeo

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- channel, download videos, and play them on a mobile device without WFi.
- Sample press release: A template for a press release to promote your event. Download the Word document, update it with your specific event information, and distribute it local media, community partners and others.
- Wallet cards: A collection of printable business-card sized with Be the One branding and QR codes. They can be used as single-sided cards, combined for doublesided cards, or added to the back side of a personal business card.

Americanism report highlights Legion's dedication to youth

The American Legion recognizes February as Americanism Month – a time to reflect on the importance of upholding what the Preamble to The American Legion Constitution states, which is "To foster and perpetuate a 100 percent Americanism."

The released Americanism By-the-Numbers report for 2022 highlights the commitment by Legionnaires to uphold a 100 percent Americanism through youth program support and post activities.

Below are a few highlights from the report:

 50,575 youth from 2,975 teams played American Legion Baseball, representing 49 American Legion departments.

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- 10,597 rising high school seniors participated in 50 American Legion Boys State programs.
- 859 oratorical contests were conducted that involved 4,917 youth from 50 departments.
- 854 individual athletes and 134 shooting clubs entered the 2021–2022 postal round competition of The American Legion Junior Shooting Sports National Tournament.
- 14,205 students were presented an American Legion School Award Medal.
- 4,527 Flag Day activities were conducted by posts.
- 335 citizenship and naturalization activities were conducted in local communities
- 572 American Legion posts participated in American Education Week.
- 1,273 Get Out the Vote activities were conducted.

How to Get Members to Renew

Too often the only contact a member receives is her "dues renewal notice" sent by the American Legion Auxiliary National Headquarters office. Personal connection is necessary to help members become engaged in the organization. Below are samples for how units can reach out and make a personal connection with their members and ask them to renew their membership:

- Personal phone call: Remind members why they joined the American Legion Auxiliary. Share the ways your unit has made a difference in the lives of veterans in your community, state, and country. Encourage them to become a part of activities. Transportation may be an issue, so if your unit members can offer to provide a ride, this may be the key to increasing involvement. Offer to pick up their dues at a scheduled time.
- Personal letter: Send letters out to all of your members at the beginning of the Auxiliary year. Outline the events on a calendar for all of the exciting things your unit is planning throughout the year and let members know that their membership is important to the mission of the organization. To view a sample letter, visit www.Al_AforVeterans.org/ and click on "how to get members to renew on the lefthand side."
- Renewal Open House: Host an event at the beginning of the year where members can come renew their dues and mingle with other members. Encourage them to bring other family members along. These family members may be eligible for membership, but if not, remind them they are welcome to attend activities and that you do welcome their help in advancing the mission of the American Legion Auxiliary. Combine this event with your Legion Family. It is a win-win for everyone.
- Plan a Member Day of Recognition: Everyone needs a
 pat on the back or a "way to go." At your meetings, you
 can share information about a member's family history
 with the Auxiliary, what she is doing to advance the
 mission of the Auxiliary, her community service work,
 etc. Then share this information with your division

Eugene "Gene" Holley



SALEM, OH — Eugene "Gene" Holley, 97, formerly of Cortland, passed away Friday, Jan. 27, 2023, surrounded by close family members.

He was born in Windsor, Ohio, to Frank Holley and Margaret Scheffel Holley, May 27, 1925. He grew up in Windsor with his three brothers, Robert "Bud,"

Carl "Cart" and Richard "Dick" Holley, working on the family farm. He attended the Windsor School and High School (class of 1943), where he developed lifelong friendships and where he met the love of his life, his wife, Elinor "Ellie" Holley. He grew up in the 1930s Depression Era and (fondly) recalls being barefoot much of the summer, when shoes were only meant for school and special occasions.

Gene was most solidly a part of the American "greatest generation." After high school graduation in 1943, he volunteered for military service in World War II and became a B-17 flight navigator. Gene flew seven bombing missions over Germany in early 1945, at the age of 19. The Lady Jane II was shot down by German anti-aircraft fire and ME 262 jets. After parachuting into the countryside near Hannover, Germany, and evading capture for three days, Gene was

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captured and processed as a POW and sent to Luft Stalag 1. He spent the last few months of the war as a POW, was liberated on May 1, 1945, and subsequently flown to France in "Operation Revival."

Liberated American POWs were processed at Camp Lucky Strike in Le Havre, France. After spending his 20th birthday there, Gene rode an American troopship home. The story of his crew and aircraft, the Lady Jane II, have recently been immortalized in a book by Lisa Vans, "The Last Mission of the Lady Jane II: The Life and Death of an 8th Air Force B-17 and Her Crew."

After the war, he earned an engineering degree from Case Western Reserve University. Gene had a long career as a civil engineer in Northeastern Ohio, first as a state engineer. He worked the majority of his career at Soda Construction Company in Niles, starting as the senior engineer, and eventually purchasing it. He worked there until his retirement, after passing the company on to a son and a grandson.

Gene's greatest passion in life was for his wife and children. Gene and Ellie had a family of seven children, Paul Robert Holley, Russell Eugene Holley, Sue Anne Holley Suarez, Dan Allen Holley, Craig William Holley, Hugh Richard Holley, and Mark David Holley. Somehow, he managed to not only work tirelessly to provide, but to provide an example and act as a mentor to his children. Gene was a hero to his children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren.

Gene and Ellie had a continuing participation and influence in the lives of their children, always taking interest and helping where needed. They provided a special love, which all his children knew was unconditional.

Gene is survived by six of his seven children, and by 14 grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren.

Friends and family will be received from 10 to 11 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 25, 2023, at Lane Funeral Homes, Canfield Chapel. A memorial service will follow at 11 a.m. at the chapel, with the Rev. Bruce Irwin officiating.


