# Troiola to Congress: Apply 'Pact' to stop suicides

Calling for Congress to apply the same urgency toward stopping veteran suicide as it did toward passage of the PACT Act last year, National Commander Vincent J. "Jim" Troiola laid out The American Legion's legislative priorities before a joint session of the House and Senate Veterans' Affairs committees Wednesday morning.

After praising Congress for passing the landmark legislation which opened benefits to millions of veterans exposed to environmental toxins, Troiola reminded lawmakers about the words associated with the Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring Our PACT Act.

"Pact," 'promise' and 'honor' are terms we must also urgently apply to the epidemic of veteran suicide," Troiola said. "The American Legion's 'Be the One' initiative, which raises awareness nationally about the problem and seeks to destigmatize asking for help, is our organization's highest priority today. To us, suicide prevention is a pact we share with our friends and comrades of military service, a promise from each of us in The American Legion to 'Be the One' to save at least one other veteran from suicide."

Sen. Maggie Hassan, D-N.H., praised The American Legion for its work in stopping suicides. "Peer support programs encourage veterans to reach out and connect with one another proactively, which improves veterans mental health and reduce the risk of suicide," she said. "The American Legion recognized the importance of these programs when it created the Buddy Check program in 2019."

Sen. Angus King, I-Maine, called on the Department of Defense to take a greater role in preventing suicide among transitioning veterans. "The Pentagon should put as much time, money and effort into the transition out as they do in the recruiting in...the data shows us that the first two or three years after separation are the danger period."

Another priority that The American Legion has long advocated is the elimination of the disabled veterans tax, also known as concurrent receipt. Sen. Jon Tester, D-Mont, promised to reintroduce the Major Richard Star Act, which would eliminate the tax for more than 50,000 military retirees with combat-related injuries. Tester was also praised by King for his leadership in passing the PACT Act.

"The PACT Act would not have passed without Jon Tester," King said of Tester, who serves as the chairman of the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee.

Exorbitant legal fees charged in connection with the Camp LeJeune Justice Act drew a strong response from Sen. Dan Sullivan, R-Alaska, who sponsored Legion-supported legislation to cap what lawyers can charge.

"You've got the trial lawyers of America who are working to rip off the veterans and families of sick Marines," Sullivan said. "My bill is a choice between taking care of sick Marines and their families or enriching trial lawyers." Sullivan called advertising by predatory law firms "disgusting."

During his opening statement, Troiola pointed out that The American Legion provides assistance for such claims "free of charge."

Women's healthcare was also addressed at the hearing. "We do believe VA is moving forward, however more needs to be done," said Autrey James, chairman of The American Legion Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Commission. "There are barriers to gender-specific high-quality care (to) include not being identified as a veteran, not being recognized as a veteran by VA employees, lack of awareness and understanding of VA healthcare benefits and the perceptions that VA is an all-male healthcare system.

We have to address that and the way to address that is through training. We have to make sure that VA is properly training those who come in contact with our women veterans to ensure that they are being treated with the same care and dignity as any other veteran who enters the system."

Chairman of the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs Rep. Mike Bost, R-Ill., welcomed The American Legion's large presence in the Capitol. "The men and women of The American Legion are the greatest advocates here in D.C. and across the country. You know better than anyone else that the veterans community has earned a system that works for them."

Preventing suicide, caring for veterans top VA secretary's objectives

American Legion member Casey Nash illustrates the organization's commitment to its <u>Be the One mission</u>, as VA Secretary Denis McDonough pointed out.

Nash is the 1st district commander in the Department of Georgia. She earned combat action badges and received a Purple Heart after deploying several times post 9/11.

She is also a survivor of a suicide attempt. Her experience led her to "Be the One" to give back to others, including creating an awareness event last fall aimed at reducing the rate of veteran suicide.

"Casey credits the community she discovered through The American Legion with helping her recover, with helping her find a sense of purpose again, with helping her live," McDonough said in his speech to American Legion Family members during its 63rd Washington Conference on Feb. 28. "Today, she's building that community for dozens of other veterans in her area, sharing stories and supporting one another in the moments when it matters the most."

The secretary embraced the Legion as a partner in pursuing the same goals: reducing the rate of veteran suicide, providing the highest standard of health care for veterans and more.

"We all have to be there for veterans when it matters most, especially in times of crisis," he said. "Two years ago, we failed a veteran — Major Ian Fishback — because we didn't carefully coordinate our response to his needs across federal, state and county systems."

That experience prompted a year-long project among VA's Office of Mental Health and Suicide Prevention, VISN 10 and Michigan state authorities.

"We're better positioned to ensure that a vet isn't responsible for managing complex governmental bureaucracies," he said. "We're responsible. We have to do that, for all veterans."

Outlining five steps to quell the suicide rate, McDonough said, "Vets need and deserve suicide prevention solutions that meet them where they are, rather than taking a one-size-fits-all approach."

The steps are:

- VA's daybreak challenge to build out proven new solutions developed by Americans in communities across the country. "These investments will help develop innovations that will save veterans' lives."
- Staff Sgt. Parker Gordon Fox Suicide Prevention Grants are driving resources to local suicide prevention services.
- As part of Suicide Prevention 2.0, VA is recruiting, hiring, and training more than 100 licensed mental health providers serving veterans at high risk of suicide.
- The expansion of coverage through the COMPACT Act, which is connecting VA to new veterans who may have never used VA resources previously. "You have my commitment that we ensure that veterans receive the suicide crisis care they need when and where they need it without ever having to worry about receiving a bill."

 The hiring of over 1,300 peer support specialists who "use their personal experiences with their own recovery to help struggling fellow veterans reconnect, find a sense of belonging, and access resources at VA and in their communities."

McDonough credited The American Legion for its role in addressing the problem.

"Vets helping vets, long after they take off the uniform. There's nothing better than that. There's nothing more effective than that. And there's no one who does that better than The American Legion.

"But suicide prevention takes all of us ... pulling together in the same direction to save lives. And with all this work, and more, saving lives is exactly what we're going to do. And, together, we will do it."

The secretary embraced the Legion's commitment to providing the highest standard of health care for veterans. "Together we can solve problems with full transparency," he said. "We are proud of our accomplishments. But we are going to be candid about our failings — candid with ourselves, with you, with veterans and with the American people. We still can, and still must, be better — and do better — for the veterans we serve."

Veterans had more than 73 million outpatient appointments at VA in the past year, McDonough said. Additionally, there were 37 million more outpatient appointments with community care providers. Since 2020, the number of virtual visits has surpassed 23 million, an increase of 3,000%.

McDonough also pointed to another Legionnaire, Chris Earl, the founder of Regiment Gaming. The community — at 20,000 strong, the largest in the nation — is for veterans, active-duty military, and their families. It engages younger veterans and helps to connect them with VA resources.

"Chris teamed up with The American Legion, collaborating in a few different ways, including wildly successful online gaming tournaments for veterans," McDonough noted. "In this community, veterans started asking each other questions about how to use the VA for care and benefits. The camaraderie they built over video game competitions has turned into trust, and a willingness to ask tough, personal questions from virtual friends living on opposite sides of the country."

McDonough noted the importance for VA in connecting with younger veterans. While VA's satisfaction surveys are

mostly positive, younger veterans as a group don't trust VA as much as their older comrades.

"It's exactly the kind of mutually supportive veteran community The American Legion built 100 years ago, redesigned for the digital age," the secretary said. "It helps build trust in VA where we need it most – with younger vets who may be suspicious of VA – or heard horror stories of wait times and bureaucracy at VA. Together – the Legion and VA – can build the responsive claims process vets deserve, because I know we at VA still have a lot of work to do to meet our responsibility to veterans today."

The claims process, in fact, set a record last year with 1.7 million claims reaching decisions. However, "we're on pace to break that record this year," McDonough said.

Since the PACT Act became law last August, the overall number of claims filed has surged to more than 1 million, a 24% increase year over year.

Thus far, there have been more than 103,000 awards granted for toxic exposure claims. McDonough encouraged veterans to take these steps:

- 1. Enroll, if you are not already, part of VA.
- Apply for toxic exposure benefits and care right now.
   By applying before Aug. 10, the benefits will be back-dated to Aug. 10 of last year, when the bill was signed into law.
- 3. Get a toxic exposure screening at your VA medical center. Nearly 2 million veterans already have.
- Work with an American Legion service officer on your benefits. It's a free service for all veterans.

Sons, Legion Family lay wreaths at Tomb of Unknown and memorials during Washington Conference

An annual tradition in conjunction with The American Legion's Washington Conference sees the Sons of The American Legion lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

On Sunday, as he laid the wreath, SAL National Commander Christopher Carlton was saying a prayer "for all our servicemen and women and the families that lost (loved ones)." "Taking that minute to remember ... all those that have passed, all those that are buried here in Arlington, it's a great honor and privilege," Carlton said.

Carlton and approximately 150 other members of the American Legion Family also laid wreaths at the Vietnam and World War II memorials at the National Mall.

Detachment of Michigan assistant sergeant of arms Seth Fisher placed a wreath at Michigan's section of the World War II memorial with his father, Detachment Commander Victor Fisher. Seth Fisher said it meant a lot to do that.

"It's generational," Seth Fisher said. "I hope to do that in my future too so I can continue to support the vets from generation to generation."

Martin Widmer of Squadron 262 in Audubon, N.J., said the day was "overwhelming."

"There's a lot of feelings, especially when you have relatives on those walls." Widmer said.

# Alex Palou looking to expand 'Be the One' reach while setting sights on Indy 500

The 2023 INDYCAR SERIES gets underway this weekend with the <u>Firestone Grand Prix of St. Petersburg</u> in Florida. The American Legion and Chip Ganassi Racing (CGR) are again partnering this season, with CGR's drivers featuring American Legion branding through the year.

This weekend, 2021 INDYCAR SERIES champ Alex Palou will be driving the No. 10 American Legion "Be the One" livery, sharing with millions of racing fans the Legion's suicide-prevention initiative.

Earlier this year, Palou sat down with American Legion Social Media Manager Steven B. Brooks to talk about the upcoming season, including his goals and what it's like to share the Legion's "Be the One" on his livery throughout the season.

The American Legion: You've driven The American Legion car a handful of times during the two previous seasons. Now that's going to be expanded this season, with the focus on "Be the One." What does it mean to you to have that livery and be representing The American Legion when you're out on the track in car?

Alex Palou: For me, especially, I feel honored. I think the progress we've had with the relationship, we started with two races in 2021, and then a lot more races in 2022, and now in 2023 being the primary (sponsor) in the car, it gives us the opportunity to put in more work and try to get to more people. Last year, when we started with the 'Be the One' campaign, it was pretty motivational for a guy that not only represents a company or a sponsor but can represent more people and try to directly help people. It's been special, and I can't wait to try to put in more work and try to help more people.

Question: You've been able to meet with members of The American Legion at various races throughout the past two years. What has that interaction meant, being able to actually look into the eyes of the people you're representing on the car, and how much are you looking forward to doing that this season?

Palou: When you can represent a group, and you can meet them and interact more with them, it makes it more special and more satisfying. You can see the work that you're putting in and all the team...and meet The American Legion members that are pushing for you. When I meet people at the racetracks, some veterans, they come and I show the car and we talk a little bit about the race, that's when I really get the interaction with them. It's quite good and quite satisfying when you can meet the people that you are helping and the people you are working with.

Question: INDYCAR has a large and diverse audience. How important is it to get that "Be the One" message out about the number of veteran suicides that are happening daily and what someone can do at the local level to help?

Palou: When you hear the actual (veteran suicide) numbers from each day, it's quite brutal. We're just trying to help people to help people. Because that's the way that it can improve a lot, if each one can help even one person, if we all do that, we can help a lot of persons. I think the 'Be the One' campaign worked a lot last year and was easy to understand for people and what you can actually do as an individual.

Question: How does it feel that you're one of the ones sharing that message and providing that education, and possibly making a difference in the life of a veteran?

Palou: I think I'm lucky to have that voice. It could be that you want to have that voice, but you can't reach people. I'm lucky to be in the position I am, to be able to go to some events, to some races, do a lot of interviews ... and try to help. If I can help one person, that will mean a lot more

than everything else in life. I think with the relationship we have now with The American Legion and INDY and Ganassi, we're helping and we're reaching a lot of people.

Question: You've had a pretty impressive two-year run, winning the INDYCAR SERIES championship two years ago and finishing fifth last year. What are the goals this year, as an individual driver and as part of the team?

Palou: Win. We were successful in 2021, we were really successful in the beginning of 2022, but we were unable to maximize everything. We would get a lot of podiums but no wins until the end of the season. That hurts you a lot, because the difference between winning and finishing second or third is brutal. We've got some things together for this year, we've got some more experience, we've got a lot of confidence and a group of guys we're working with that are really, really strong. I feel confident to go out and win the Indy 500 and win the (series) championship. Obviously, I have one championship, but that just created a hunger for more. But the thing that comes first is the Indianapolis 500. It's the biggest race of our season and of motorsport racing, and I need to win that race."

## Palou to drive No. 10 American Legion Honda to kickoff INDYCAR SERIES

The 2023 NTT INDYCAR Series season kicks off this weekend, and The American Legion's "Be the One" suicide-prevention will be on full display on the track.

Chip Ganassi Racing's Alex Palou, the 2021 series champ, will be driving the No. 10 American Legion Honda that features "Be the One" branding in the Firestone Grand Prix of St. Petersburg. Palou finished fifth in last year's series post standings in finished second behind Scott McLaughlin last year in the St. Petersburg Race.

The Firestone Grand Prix is 100 laps, with the 1.8-mile course featuring 14 turns and incorporating streets of downtown St. Petersburg and a section of runway of Albert Whitted Airport. After the long frontstretch, there's a tight right-hander into Turn 1 and then a quick left-hand turn. Plenty of drivers have gotten into trouble in these two turns over the years. There are two other long straights with heavy braking zones that afford opportunities to overtake.

- Friday, March 3 practice 3–4:15 p.m. ET, Peacock.
- Saturday, March 4 practice 10–11 a.m., Peacock; qualifications 2:15–3:30 p.m., Peacock.
- Saturday, March 5 warmup 9-9:30 a.m., Peacock; NXT race 9:50-11:05 a.m., Peacock; NTT INDYCAR SERIES race, noon-2:30 p.m., NBC and Peacock.

Three Things to Look for at St. Petersburg (via INDYCAR)

- 1. Can anyone dethrone the kings? Chip Ganassi Racing and Team Penske have won the past 10 titles with Scott Dixon, Will Power and Josef Newgarden combining for eight of them. So, who breaks the streak? It's best to look Arrow McLaren, where Alexander Rossi (No. 7 Arrow McLaren Chevrolet), Felix Rosenqvist (No. 6 Arrow McLaren Chevrolet) and Pato O'Ward (No. 5 Arrow McLaren Chevrolet) are employed, or Andretti Autosport's Colton Herta (No. 26 Gainbridge Honda). Those four drivers were the highest-placed drivers in the championship who didn't drive for Team Penske or Chip Ganassi in 2022. Herta, O'Ward and Rossi are the only three in that group to find victory last season.
- Power Plays Poles at Will. Will Power is the greatest qualifier in modern INDYCAR SERIES history, as his 68 career poles are the all-time series record. The tale of Power's qualifying success can best be told through the Firestone Grand Prix of St. Petersburg, where he has won nine of the last 13 poles. The only drivers to score a pole in the last 10 years in St. Petersburg not named Will Power are Takuma Sato in 2014, Robert Wickens in 2018, Colton Herta in 2021 and Scott McLaughlin last season. In total, Team Penske has won the pole position in 11 of the past 16 St. Petersburg races. Power has scored at least one pole position in each season since 2009, including five NTT P1 Awards last year. It's a sure bet that the reigning series champion will add to his record this season, and don't be surprised if it starts during NTT P1 Award qualifying Saturday afternoon.

3. Dixon Seeks His First Win on the Streets of St. Petersburg. Who wouldn't take Scott Dixon's resume as an NTT INDYCAR SERIES driver? He has six NTT INDYCAR SERIES championships, which trails only the seven INDYCAR SERIES titles collected by A.J. Foyt. His 53 wins rank second on the all-time INDYCAR SERIES victory list, behind Foyt's 67, but Dixon has never won at St. Petersburg. Still, he has been successful on the streets of the Florida Gulf Coast city. Dixon has four runner-up finishes at the circuit and has an average finish of 7.88 in his 18 previous starts. He has finished in the top 10 in his last seven starts.



Texas Rangers shortstop Corey Seager named 2023 Legion Baseball Graduate of the Year

Texas Rangers shortstop Corey Seager has been selected as the 2023 American Legion Baseball Graduate of the Year. Seager played Legion Baseball for Post 115 in Kannapolis, N.C.

Scheduling of the official award presentation is still in the works.

Seager is a three-time All-Star who in 2020 became just the eighth player — and third American Legion Baseball alumnus — to earn League Championship Series and World Series MVP honors in the same season when he helped lead the Los Angeles Dodgers to the seventh title in franchise history and first since 1988.

In the 2020 NLCS, Seager set series records with five home runs and 11 RBIs as the Dodgers rallied from a 3-1 deficit to defeat the Atlanta Braves. Seager then hit .400 with two home runs, five RBIs and seven runs scored as Los Angeles beat Tampa Bay in six games in the World Series.

In December 2021, after seven seasons with the Dodgers, Seager signed a 10-year, \$325 million contract with the Texas Rangers — the largest contract in franchise history. He hit a career-high 33 home runs — albeit with a careerlow .245 batting average — in his first season with the Rangers.

In addition to his postseason and All-Star honors, Seager has been National League Rookie of the Year, a two-time Silver Slugger Award winner and All-MLB Second Team.

Tester: You live up to promises you make to veterans Steven B. Brooks | February 28, 2023

Looking ahead to this session of Congress, Sen. Jon Tester had strong words regarding cutting the federal budget when it comes to caring for the nation's veterans.

Addressing The American Legion during the organization's Washington Conference on Feb. 28. the chairman of the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs said the U.S. government cannot renege on a pact it made with those who've worn the nation's uniform.

"Some folks who serve in Congress ... want to roll back the budget. But they roll back the budget, they roll back funding for our veterans," he said. "Don't let them tell you anything different. That's a bad idea. I know about fiscal discipline. But when you make promises to people who served this country, you live up to those promises. We will get that done."

Tester also spoke about a piece of pending legislation fully supported by The American Legion: the <u>Major Richard Star Act</u>. The legislation would allow veterans who are medically retired due to injuries sustained in combat to receive their retirement pay without forfeiting their disability compensation.

"We're going to be working on that, and with your support ... we'll see that baby across the finish line, too," Tester said. "Democracy works when people speak up and make sure their opinions are heard, and The American Legion is right there when making sure that democracy works."

Ensuring the Department of Veterans Affairs has the capacity to treat all veterans also is a priority for Tester. "The VA needs to step up and make sure they have the doctors, the nurses, and the facilities, but we need to give them the ability to make sure that happens, and that old facilities go away. We've got a number of bills to do that that I'm pushing

on, bipartisan in nature in the United States Senate that we're going to be working on to get done."

Tester said those inside the Beltway, and many others, don't understand the challenges faced by rural veterans. That is why American Legion support was so critical for one specific piece of legislation.

"That's why I am particularly proud that last year we had the largest expansion of VA healthcare ever in this country in a bill known as the PACT Act," he said. "It is a bill that every veteran service organization in this country was their No. 1 priority. Yet it is a bill that never would have passed if not for you. I am here to say to you, thank you. Your voice was heard, and we ended up passing a very important piece of legislation that impacts probably the majority of your members."



National commander addresses legislative priorities for new Congress

American Legion National Commander Vincent J. "Jim" Troiola applauded legislative victories for veterans in the 117th Congress in his opening remarks to members of the Legion Family Feb. 28 at the Washington Conference during the Commander's Call.

"One of our biggest agenda items last year was the PACT Act. Because of your hard work it passed," said Troiola of the legislation, which will allow more than 3.5 million toxic-exposed veterans eligible for VA benefits.

Another piece of significant legislation passed was the Buddy Check Week Act that requires VA to implement a national buddy check week, mirroring the Legion's Buddy Check program. "It's a great step toward creating meaningful suicide prevention measures."

That led Troiola to voice the Legion's <u>Be the One</u> initiative to reduce veteran suicide by destigmatizing the need for veterans to ask for help and encourage everyone to "Be the One" to ask if a veteran is OK.

"We need to push for the expansion of counseling and innovative, evidence-based, complementary and alternative medicine," Troiola said. "We must remind our senators, representatives and their staff that they have no higher calling than the care and well-being of our veterans, our active military and their families."

Legion Family members will visit with their respective representatives and senators following the Commander's Call to voice the Legion's legislative priorities for the 118th Congress, 1st Session. Troiola highlighted a few of those priorities.

Protect and improve the GI Bill. Higher education, vocational training and home ownership are benefits are earned through service and sacrifice. "Yet, reservists and National Guardsmen are often deprived of these benefits. We must urge Congress to honor their service by granting them parity in the awarding of GI Bill benefits."

Respect the U.S. flag. "It means amending the U.S. Constitution to allow Congress to once again claim the right to protect the flag from desecration. The flag used to cover the caskets of our fallen military heroes."

Protect veterans from predatory actors. There are law firms "that are overcharging veterans after they had already been exposed to contaminated drinking water. We urge Congress to impose a cap on legal services provided in association with the Camp Lejeune Justice Act."

Advocate for citizenship for military service. "It is unjust to deport veterans who served honorably and have expressed a willingness to fight and die for this country."

Ensure the Coast Guard is paid. "This means paying the U.S. Coast Guard, uninterrupted, during any future government shutdowns."

"Thank you all for being here today to advocate in our nation's capital on behalf of our fellow veterans and service-members," Troiola said. "Our American Legion Family is strong. We have four solid pillars – National Defense, Veterans, Youth and Americanism. All of these offer opportunities to grow and serve our community. All of these can be used to build an even more powerful and yes, better, American Legion."
