Video shows Russian jet colliding with US drone

Video footage released Thursday by U.S. European Command shows a Russian fighter jet buzzing past a U.S. Reaper drone above the Black Sea multiple times, before colliding with the aircraft.

The 42-second video depicts a Russian Su-27 aircraft trailing an unmanned MQ-9 aircraft that was operating within international airspace. The incident, which occurred Tuesday morning, involved two Russian Su-27s, one of which struck the propeller of the MQ-9, causing U.S. forces to bring the drone down in international waters.

The video was recorded by a camera angled at the rear of the surveillance aircraft, which captured the incoming Russian fighters dumping fuel on the drone as it passed on two occasions. The video then goes grainy after the second pass, indicating some kind of collision.

While intercepts between U.S. and Russian military aircraft have happened repeatedly in recent years, the incident marked the first known collision. It set off a

diplomatic firestorm between two countries already deeply at odds over Moscow's war in Ukraine.

Following the crash of the MQ-9, the U.S. summoned Russia's ambassador in Washington. Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin also spoke with Russia's defense chief, Sergei Shoigu, about the issue.

Gen. Mark Milley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, told reporters that the downed drone was likely unrecoverable. But he didn't rule out trying to get the wreckage back.

"It's probably about maybe 4,000 or 5,000 feet of water, something like that. So any recovery operation is very difficult at that depth by anyone," Miley said.

Still, Milley said steps were taken to ensure that any sensitive intelligence aboard the aircraft was "no longer of value" should the Russians recover it.

Russia's Defense Ministry on Tuesday blamed the incident on the U.S., saying the drone maneuvered sharply and crashed after Russian fighters scrambled to intercept it near Crimea.

But EUCOM, following the collision, said the incident followed a pattern of dangerous actions by Russian pilots in international airspace, including over the Black Sea.

"These aggressive actions by Russian air crew are dangerous and could lead to miscalculation and unintended escalation," a EUCOM statement said.

This is not your typical yoga

Twenty veterans and AC/DC's "Thunderstruck" filled American Legion Post 34 in Cave Creek, Ariz.

"Two minutes! Buckle up baby, put on your seat belts," post member Scott French bellowed to the barefoot men and women standing on yoga mats.

This is not your ordinary yoga class. "It's for old, grayhaired guys, covered in tattoos, riding Harleys that never would be caught dead doing yoga," explains French, a 90% disabled veteran who served in the U.S. Army's 2nd Infantry Division during the 1980s.

Instead of downward dog pose, there is a peeing dog move. In fact, there are no poses. No mentions of butterflies, pigeon pose or savasana. Instead, there are moves and techniques like touchdown, screaming eagle and diamond cutter. Like yoga, they are designed to move the body and relax the mind. Unlike yoga, songs from Metallica, ZZ Top, Van Halen and others funnel more energy into the packed hall. This is DDPY, a program developed by former professional wrestler Diamond Dallas Page. It's a high-energy routine with clapping, smiling and plenty of sweating, says French, a former martial arts instructor.

"My disability is challenging," he says, noting doctors had recommended spinal fusion surgery and knee replacement. "I found myself in a state of depression with a busted back. I was also going to VA for four hours a week for counseling and rehab."

DDPY fixed French's body and mind, then inspired him to help his fellow veterans the same way. About four years ago he started teaching and leading four weekly classes for veterans at Post 34. Some are stand-up classes; others are chair yoga.

"It's a modern yoga system," French said. "Many veterans have used this program to rebuild themselves, or as we like to say, resurrect themselves. I went on to lose about 40

pounds, and rebuild my core to support my lumbar so I avoided the spinal surgery."

Participants also realize it's not just their bodies that improve.

"The mental aspect is one of the most powerful aspects of DDPY," he says. "Exercise is a very strong tool to use against depression and anxiety. There is a mind and body connection. DDPY helps you with anxiety and depression. By the end of the work, you have been able to de-stress and ease depression."

When French learned about The American Legion's Be the One initiative, he saw an opportunity to combine classes in early March with raising awareness about mental health. That ties in with Warrior's Purpose, a subset of DDPY. "Be the One and Warrior's Purpose have the same mission: to help reduce veteran suicide and rip the stigma off mental health talking about mental health," French explained. "It's important to talk about mental health, especially during these times."

French saw an opportunity to introduce Be the One at his post during a week's worth of yoga classes. Participants were greeted with a special Be the One table with information and an introduction to the initiative at the start of each session.

During a brief water break during one class, French called out to Connie McGuffin, "You're kicking ass!" Wearing an "Unstoppable" T-shirt and a wide smile, she retorted, "no, you're kicking ass!"

Fact is, they are all.

McGuffin became interested in yoga thanks to her husband, Robert Stewart, who is a Sons of The American Legion and Riders member at Post 36 in Tucson. When he started yoga four years ago, he weighed over 400 pounds, battled depression, feasted on fast food, and used alcohol and drugs. "I just wanted to be a better individual, so I started the program," says Stewart, who has lost 162 pounds, begun a healthy diet and embraced sobriety. "I gained respect for myself and an understanding of the body. The program helped me develop discipline and get into a good mental space."

Now, Stewart wants to give back and start a similar program at his post. He is inspired by his grandfather, former Air Force pilot James Singelton, who signed the paperwork for Stewart to join the SAL two days before he passed away.

"I want to serve to honor him for his service that gave me the right to be here and for us to live in freedom," he said. "He was a great man."

To be able to teach DDPY, Stewart needs to gain his certification, which he is pursuing now. "It helps me structure myself, create discipline and give me a goal. No matter what chaos happens during the day, I know that I have that goal and I know that I am headed to where I want to be. All I want to do is to inspire people so they can feel what I feel. And I feel amazing."

Admitting she was skeptical of yoga; McGuffin is now a believer. "I thought it was wimpy. I was a kick boxer growing up. I was very rough on my body. I rode horses and dirt bikes, and crashes and getting thrown is part of that."

As she aged, those injuries and life stresses caused pain, spiked depression and led her to try pills to get relief. "Anything to ease the pain and get some rest."

Two of her sons dealt with their own issues related to drugs, including prison time, which exacerbated her stress. Then she met Stewart, a motorcycle rider, heavy metal fan and DDPY participant. So McGuffin gave this brand of yoga a try. "My love of Robert sparked my love for yoga," she said. "We do still suffer from depression. With yoga, you can mentally detox and cleanse your mind. I can get up now and move. That rust shakes off and you feel so good about yourself again.

"This is not your momma's yoga. It's intense, it kicks your butt and it feels good."

Rob Ramsey, a 100% disabled veteran, is another walking example of the power of DDPY.

After his service, the Army veteran was involved in an accident in August 2001 that left one foot immobile, forced him to retire from his civilian job and sank him into depression. "I was on a very high dose of fentanyl. I was a functioning junkie for 17 years," he recalled. "They told me I should retire. And I retreated to my couch where I was a prisoner in my own home. I used a walker or a cane to get around."

Three years ago he got himself off the opioids and then started the yoga program. "I just recently started to get movement in that foot again," he says. "I like to ride bicycles a lot. But riding a bike did not help the foot. In fact, DDPY got me back to riding a bike."

He started out slowly, first with chair yoga before progressing to performing the moves while standing. "Any soldier

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who is worth his salt would rather be on his feet than on that couch. It got me back up on my feet. And I was able to do whatever I wanted, whenever I wanted. It changed my entire life."



The American Legion's "I Pledge Allegiance" comic book is the last one to be updated as part of the Legion's Rally Around the Flag campaign to instill pride and respect for the American flag. The

other two comic books that have been recently updated for purchase include <u>"Our Country's Veterans"</u> and <u>"Our Country's Flag."</u>

"I Pledge Allegiance" is a fun, interactive activity book for elementary students that educates on why we recite the Pledge of Allegiance, what each word means and why our flag is important. A group of classmates follow a bald eagle named Abe as he shares these answers, and explains much more such as why we have 50 stars and 13 stripes and how to recite the Pledge properly (hand over heart, etc.). For activities, the comic book features an American flag for kids to color, a set of pictures that asks students to put an X where people are showing allegiance to the flag, a blank box to draw what freedom means, space to write in our freedoms, a connect the dots and a matching game.

"I Pledge Allegiance" is available for <u>purchase through Emblem Sales</u>, <u>Item No. 755.302</u>. The cost is 85 cents apiece or 100 for 69 cents apiece. This comic book is an educational tool Legion Family members can give to elementary students to help them understand the importance of the Pledge of Allegiance and how to show allegiance to the American flag.

The American Legion's Washington Conference last week concluded with National Commander Vincent J. "Jim" Troiola presenting our legislative priorities for the 118th Congress before a joint session of the Senate and House Veterans' Affairs Committees, but you can still participate!

Share The American Legion's Legislative Priorities with Members of Congress

Amongst the priorities Commander Troiola testified on include:

 Protect veterans from predatory actors. There are law firms "that are overcharging veterans after they had

- already been exposed to contaminated drinking water. We urge Congress to impose a cap on legal services provided in association with the Camp Lejeune Justice Act."
- Protect and improve the GI Bill. Higher education, vocational training and home ownership are benefits are earned through service and sacrifice. "Yet, reservists and National Guardsmen are often deprived of these benefits. We must urge Congress to honor their service by granting them parity in the awarding of GI Bill benefits."
- Ensure the Coast Guard is paid. "This means paying the U.S. Coast Guard, uninterrupted, during any future government shutdowns."
- Advocate for citizenship for military service. "It is unjust to deport veterans who served honorably and have expressed a willingness to fight and die for this country."
- Respect the U.S. flag. "It means amending the U.S. Constitution to allow Congress to once again claim the right to protect the flag from desecration. The flag used to cover the caskets of our fallen military heroes."



NJ Unit 105 receives Charter

BELLEVILLE, NJ – With perhaps 40 or 50 members and friends of American Legion Post 105 in attendance, American Legion Auxiliary (ALA) Unit 105 received its charter at a meeting in late February. The unit has been pursuing a charter through a process that has been on-and-off since

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before the pandemic in 2020, which has kicked into full gear over the past few months.

With assistance along the way from members of the Sons of the American Legion (SAL) Squadron 105 in Belleville, as well as from members of the state-level ALA, Unit 105 charters with 29 members on its initial roster. Two of those members are Juniors – members who are under 18 years old. In the two weeks since that meeting, Belleville's new Auxiliary has gained perhaps ten new members.

Unit President MaryAnn Slaughter called the meeting to order at 7pm, and following the Pledge of Allegiance, turned the meeting over to the representatives from the state-level Auxiliary to speak.

"We finally got it done, and I'm proud of the ladies who got this going ... it has been a lot of hard work", stated Department of NJ President Colleen Breen-Lopez. "You have one of the best support systems here ... one of the best Sons [SAL's] up here ... and this Post is going to be one of the biggest Posts in the state. You guys have the drive, you have everything going for you, and I'm so happy."

Founded in 1919, the national all-volunteer American Legion Auxiliary has nearly 1 million members from all walks of life. The Auxiliary administers hundreds of volunteer programs, gives tens of thousands of hours to its communities and to veterans, and raises millions of dollars to support its own programs, as well as other worthwhile charities familiar to Americans. Like the Legion, the Auxiliary's interests have broadened to encompass the entire community.

The American Legion Auxiliary is made up of the male and female spouses, grandmothers, mothers, sisters, and direct and adopted female descendants of members of The American Legion. Through its nearly 10,500 units located in every state and some foreign countries, the Auxiliary embodies the spirit of America that has prevailed through war and peace.

The chartering process requires the interest group receive an endorsement from its sponsoring Post, meeting the required number of new members, electing temporary officers, and developing a program molding the group into a cohesive unit developing plans to work on behalf of our local veterans and community.

Finally, in February, the charter and charter membership roll received from National Headquarters was presented to the ecstatic new members at Post 105 by Department President Colleen Breen-Lopez and Department Membership Chairman Lisa Natale. When President Breen-Lopez signed

the charter in front of everyone, the room exploded in applause. That sentiment of excitement was echoed by Membership Chairman Natale – "you guys are a phenomenal group and I know you will do some amazing things."

Members from the Military Order of the Purple Heart Chapter 366, Auxiliary Unit 70 in Nutley, and SAL Detachment of NJ Commander Mark Natale were also in attendance to show their support.

Post 105 Commander Joe Cobianchi spoke briefly as well. "Four years ago we tried ... and we tried and we tried. I'm very glad we're here now. This has been a long time coming. American Legion, SAL, and the Auxiliary....Together we're family – the 105 Family!"

Before the meeting adjourned, SAL 105 Adjutant Rusty Myers also took the floor to commend the elected president of the new unit, noting that "[President] MaryAnn [Slaughter] has been the lighthouse keeper over the years with this. This has started and fizzled, and started and fizzled, but the one constant over the years has been MaryAnn, keeping the ALA dream alive. She's been fueling the light at the lighthouse...so this is your day today."

Following the meeting, pictures upon pictures were taken showing nothing but smiles on the faces of the charter members. A group photo of the entire Post – Sons and Legionnaires alongside the new Auxiliary Unit – was also captured.

18-year-old using 2023 to prep for INDYCAR while sharing Legion's suicide-prevention efforts

Eighteen-year-old Kyffin Simpson is one of the new faces with Chip Ganassi Racing (CGR) this year. The Cayman Islands native began racing at age 9 and won the 2021 Formula Regional Americas Championship, taking first in seven of the series' races.

Kyffin was signed to a multi-year development role with Chip Ganassi Racing, and his No. 21 HMD Motorsports Indy

Lights team receives driver mentorship, race strategy and engineering support from CGR through their Road to Indy program. He'll compete in the Indy NXT Series.

Prior to the season, Simpson spoke with American Legion Social Media Manager Steven B. Brooks about his inaugural season with CGR and representing The American Legion's "Be the One" suicide-prevention initiative branding that will be featuring on his car at times this season.

The American Legion: What does this opportunity with Chip Ganassi Racing mean to you?

Simpson: It's huge. I get to work with all of them, and have gotten to work with all their engineers and drivers and learn from all of them. It's been great so far, and I think it will be great into the future as well. It's great to work with Chip. It's great to learn from him and from all of his staff. I'm very fortunate to have this opportunity.

Question: What kind of goals have you set for yourself, being with the team for the first year? What are you looking for from yourself and as a contributor to the team?

Simpson: This year I'm focused on my racing model for the NXT Series and my (Le Mans Prototype 2) stuff that I'll be doing as well. So, I'm making sure I'm going to be as good as I can be in all of those. When I'm with the team, I'm focused on learning what I can for INDYCAR for when I'm there eventually: learning strategy and learning the rules that may be different or may not be different, and just making sure that I'm as prepared for INDYCAR as possible.

Question: You have some pretty good brains to go to – obviously not just Chip, but also the drivers. What's it like having those guys around and being able to pick their brains and talk to them a little bit, and do you think that will be a valuable resource as the season gets underway?

Simpson: Yeah, for sure. It's an invaluable resource. I think it's been eight months or so (since signing with CGR), and I already did my INDYCAR test. And I think that everything that I've been working with them on has prepared me well for when I did that test, and I think it definitely helped me out when I first got in the car.

Question: When you learned about what "Be the One" means and the mission behind it, how do you feel about being able to be a part of spreading that message and trying to stem the tide of veteran suicides?

Simpson: I think it's incredibly important. I think it's always a shame when anyone takes their life, but even more so

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when you hear the stories of these great veterans who have gone overseas and fought for our freedom, and when they come back and they're struggling with suicide, it's a tough topic and it's a tough situation. So, it's great to be able to help in however small of a way or big of a way possible.

Question: What will it mean for you when you're out there racing, that The American Legion branding is on your car and you're representing men and women who at one time made the decision to halt their lives and put on the uniform of the U.S. Armed Forces?

Simpson: It means everything. They sacrificed a big part of their lives to go fight for our freedom. It's not something I could even fathom doing. So, it's just huge respect for anyone who decides to help out in the military in any way. It's a lot to think about. It's a lot of people you're representing, and it's really awesome I can help."

Legion Baseball flashback: Memphis ended 1968 season with title, 22-game winning streak

With 46 total state titles, Memphis, Tenn., has long been an American Legion Baseball power.

That was particularly true from 1959 to 1977 when head coach Tony Gagliano guided his teams to 18 state titles, six American Legion World Series appearances and a 1968 ALWS championship team that was led by two future major leaguers.

The 1968 title came in a year in which Memphis finished with a 52-5 overall record and a season-ending 22-game winning streak.

Gagliano, who coached more than 20 future major leaguers during his time as Memphis head coach, had two stars on

his 1968 team in pitcher-outfielders Don Castle and Ross Grimsley.

Castle, a three-sport star at nearby Coldwater, Miss., High School, turned down a \$35,000 signing bonus from the Washington Senators after he was the No. 8 overall pick in the 1968 major league draft to play American Legion Baseball.

After winning 16 high school games (with eight no-hitters) and leading Coldwater High to a Mississippi state title in the spring of 1968, he had a 17-1 pitching record and .362 batting average and earned George W. Rulon American Legion Baseball Player of the Year honors in leading Memphis to the ALWS title.

Castle went 3–0 with 42 strikeouts in 20 innings in Memphis' Mid-South Regional championship in Arlington, Tex., before winning two more games and picking up a save in the ALWS in Manchester, N.H.

A 10-year professional who played one season with the Texas Rangers, Castle eventually was inducted into the Northwest Mississippi Community College Hall of Fame for his time as the Rangers' head coach after his playing career ended.

Grimsley, a two-sport star at Memphis Frayseur High School, was the No. 17 overall pick by the Cincinnati Reds in the 1969 major league draft.

For Memphis Post 1 in 1968, Grimsley had a 15-1 pitching record and .306 batting average, highlighted by being Tennessee state tournament MVP with a no-hitter and .667 batting average in three Post 1 victories and being the winning pitcher in Memphis' 4-3 victory over Klamath Falls, Ore., in the 1968 ALWS championship game.

Grimsley would spend 17 years in professional baseball — 11 in the majors — as a pitcher who won 154 games overall and 124 in the major leagues. A 1980 National League All-Star for the Montreal Expos, Grimsley has been a minor league pitching coach for the Baltimore Orioles, Atlanta Braves, Seattle Mariners, Philadelphia Phillies and San Francisco Giants organizations.

A 7-6 victory over San Antonio in the Mid-South Regional final was Memphis' most dramatic win in its postseason run that also included Castle and Grimsley throwing two nohitters apiece in Tennessee state competition.

Memphis trailed 6-0 after seven innings before scoring five times in the eighth and twice in the ninth to take the victory;

Castle pitched two innings of relief for the victory and also drove in the tying run with a ninth-inning RBI double and later scoring the winning run.

Gagliano's teams also advanced to the ALWS in 1963, 1965, 1967, 1972 and 1973 and finished as runner-up in 1963, 1972 and 1973.

Among the other professional players he coached were his nephew Phil Gagliano, Tim McCarver, Tucker Ashford and Mike Paxton.

Shortly after Anthony J. "Tony" Gagliano died at 61 after a long illness in 1978, the field his Legion Baseball teams played on was named in his honor.



American Legion Baseball enjoys a reputation as one of the most successful and tradition-rich amateur athletic leagues. Today, the program registers more than 5,400 teams in all 50 states, including Canada and Puerto Rico.

Let's promote the value of military service

March 15, 2023

As U.S. military veterans, we know the value of service. Unfortunately, too many young people today do not. Worse yet, they are getting crossed signals from their peers, and even some adults.

Recruitment numbers are alarmingly down across the branches of service. Army Maj. Gen. Johnny Davis told The American Legion's Veterans Employment & Education Commission last August that a variety of reasons can be blamed. One that stands out to me is a term we are hearing often today – "propensity to serve."

That means young people simply are not aware of enough good reasons to take the oath. And at a time when industry, academia and government are all in competition for the best and brightest – a "war for talent," it has been called – we need to work harder to promote those good reasons.

At the Washington Conference in late February, Marine Corps Brig. Gen. Stephen Lightfoot asked Legionnaires to "provide that spark" to future generations and encourage them to start their journeys with military service. The benefits cannot be overstated – tuition assistance, industry-specific training for those about to discharge through such programs as DoD SkillBridge, GI Bill education, VA Home Loans, high-quality health care and superior insurance and

banking through USAA, The American Legion's preferred provider of financial services, to name just a few.

Beyond those tangible advantages, we must also recognize the power and meaning of discipline unattainable in any other sector of society, along with lifelong camaraderie, the opportunity to see the world, help others in need and to protect those we love from enemies both foreign and domestic. How can we help?

More than 6,200 American Legion posts conducted Veterans in the Classroom sessions last year. More than 33,000 young people participate annually in American Legion-sponsored Scouting units. Hundreds of Junior ROTC programs are backed by local Legion support. Schools have career events, and we must encourage them to welcome recruiters. More casually, consider the neighborhood barbecue, community picnic or church event as an opportunity to share with young people the value of military service.

Wherever we make contact with young people deciding their future paths, let's commit to serve as ambassadors of the nation we swore with our lives to protect and defend. Let's answer the call Brig. Gen. Lightfoot made for us at the Washington Conference: "I need you to go on the offensive and share your service story. National service is powerful. We need to get the word out and share, at the local level, the power of service."

As I continue traveling our great nation this year, I want to hear how my fellow Legionnaires are answering that call and converting "propensity to serve" into a reason to join, rather than the alternate.

Thank you for helping us strengthen America every day.

To fulfill this and all of The American Legion's missions, it is vital to stay up to date on membership. If you have not already done so, I strongly urge you to renew now – as we celebrate the organization's 104th year of service to community, state and nation.

March 29 is designated as National Vietnam War Veterans Day and is set aside to pay special tribute to the 9 million Americans who served during the Vietnam War era, to the 58,000 names memorialized on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., and to those who never received the recognition they deserved when they returned to America from war.

March 29, 1973 is the day U.S. Military Assistance Command, Vietnam was disestablished, and the day the last U.S. combat troops departed Vietnam. Also on that day, Operation Homecoming was completed when the last of 591 U.S. prisoners were released and returned to the United States.

American Legion posts are supporting efforts to honor these veterans, along with other ceremonies held across
