In fact, in its first decade, The American Legion worked to convince the federal government to consolidate the many bureaus, office and agencies that had been created since the end of the Civil War, into one entity in 1930, The Veterans Administration.

Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Commission

Since that time The American Legion has worked tirelessly to make sure that the VA lives up to and follows its motto, "... to care for those who borne the battle, his widow and orphan..." In the decades that have followed The American Legion Family has established itself as the premier advocate for our Veterans and the care they have earned but not always receive.

Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Commission

This has been accomplished primarily under the direction and guidance of the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Commission which offers services to help Veterans and their families navigate the red tape of Federal & State VA benefit systems.

More than 2,500 accredited American Legion Service Officers are assisting no fewer than 750,000 veterans at any one time.

- Change is necessary for survival, growth and adaptation to the times.
- Most people don't like change! Not even wet babies! But, once it's done they feel better.
- Organizations have two major factors that influence their ability to change.

Culture Climate

IMPLEMENTING CHANGE

These same 2 major influences sustain organizations.

Culture, traditions, customs and past practices.

- Cannot be mandated by leadership
- Formed over time, anchored in past, sustained by group dynamics

Climate, immediate environment, process oriented.

- ▶ expose myths and false beliefs

MANAGING CHANGE

Climate

- Lead by example
- Build trust
- Open communication
- Solicit buy-in and commitment

MANAGING CHANGE

Leaders must use a thoughtful approach in making change

- ▶ Research Culture and Climate influences
- ► State purpose and benefits of change
- ► Communicate persuasively

WHEREAS, the members of the Sons of The American Legion are proud possessors of the heritage of their family's military service to the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Sons of The American Legion are committed to the principles of service and mutual helpfulness to the veterans of military service as members of The American Legion Family; and

WHEREAS, the family structure in the United States of America has changed over time and is often no longer a nuclear family structure; and

WHEREAS, organizational changes have led the Sons of The American Legion to a position of a more independent body filled with dedicated and competent individuals with significant talents who are dedicated to the goals and ambitions of The American Legion; and

WHEREAS, members are presently forced to quit the organization if their living relative in The American Legion decides to forfeit his/her membership or allow the dues to go unpaid; and

WHEREAS, we can streamline and tie the eligibility statement to the National Constitution for The American Legion and eliminate further amendments as it pertains to periods of service for the qualifying veteran to be used in membership in the Sons of The American Legion; and
