'We stand with Israel'

The American Legion strongly condemns the violence in the Mideast and extends full support for the U.S. troops heading into the Eastern Mediterranean to deter further escalation, National Commander Daniel J. Seehafer said.

"We find ourselves on the precipice of a war that could lead to the loss of more lives and lead to a broader conflict," Seehafer said. "We stand with Israel and condemn the attacks by Hamas. At the same time, we pray for those lost to the senseless violence and for the safety of our men and women in uniform who are standing by to protect our national interests."

Hamas carried out a massive attack on Israel on Saturday, firing thousands of

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rockets while dozens of Hamas fighters infiltrated the border by air, land, and sea. The attack occurred on Simchat Torah, a major Jewish holiday when Jews complete the annual cycle of reading the Torah scroll.

More than 700 Israeli civilians and members of the military had been killed. Another 2,150 were wounded. "The enemy will pay an unprecedented price," Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said, adding that Israel would "return fire of a magnitude that the enemy has not known."

Additionally, Seehafer pointed out that this attack comes at a time when Congress has failed to act on several major issues related to national security.

"The fact that the U.S. House of Representatives is without a speaker is alarming," he said. "Congress must prioritize filling the speaker's seat and expediting key matters involving our military, as confirming all general officer nominations, funding our military and ensuring our servicemembers get paid."

Later in this edition, you will find the 2023 Consolidated Reports Summary, published August 25, 2023.

When you look at the report, you will see the nearly \$10 million donated, and over 3.2 million hours volunteered. When you total the donations with the value of volunteer hours, \$114,204.21 was the total volunteer value. These are great numbers that every member of Sons of The American Legion should be very proud about.

On the flip side, we should all be ashamed that we only received 1,853 reports out of 5,938 squadrons. This means that only 31.21% of our members completed this mandatory report. Our numbers would be three times higher if we got as close to 100% reporting as possible.

Can we double, or even triple, our reporting numbers? Absolutely! For my squadron, we keep track on a monthly basis on a CSR spreadsheet. It makes it a whole lot easier at the end of the year when we already have the information and the totals in front of us.

When we see a more accurate picture of what we do, others will notice. People will want to become members when be can accurately brag about what we really do.

Every squadron participates in something. Now is the time to rethink what we do afterwards. Please take the few minutes each month to document your donations and volunteer hours. I think you will be surprised how your numbers increase for the squadron, as well as how impressive our national numbers will be.

Here in this small sleepy farming community is located the Ehrig-McTurk American Legion Post #127 where President Clapp was first exposed to the "Pretty Red Flower" (Poppy) that she used to help hand out when she was a small child. Who knew that many years later she would serve as the "Honorary Jr. Auxiliary National President" during Past American Legion Commander Jake Comer's year and then on to the National stage and serve two years because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

During a dinner at her Post/Unit that weekend, the Commander of Squadron 127 had the opportunity to speak and during his comments, he mentioned that he is frequently asked how a small squadron gets so much done. His answer has stuck with me since that day. He simply said, "we looked around our community and filled the holes." I know of no better way to describe what it is we do all across the nation for our communities! We the Sons of The American Legion "Fill the Holes!" 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Tennessee districts able to 'be the one' for veteran being evicted from home

The sign placed in his yard made it very clear how dire the situation was.

A disabled veteran in Johnson City, Tenn., was going to be evicted from his residence in less than four days. His sign stated he had run out of funds and needed help packing up, as well as renting a moving truck.

The daughter of past Greeneville American Legion Post 64 Commander Grady Barefield lives near the veteran, saw the sign and reached out to her father.

Barefield then reached out to American Legion First District Commander Jim McLaughlin to see what could be done to assist the veteran. McLaughlin reached out to Johnson City Post 24 leadership and asked them to look into the situation.

"I need you to go to this house and find out just how legit this is," McLaughlin said he told Post 24 Adjutant Michael Metzner. "If you deem this veteran is in deep trouble and we need to help ... get me a moving date and I'll rally the troops. You just let him know help is on the way."

The situation was serious, and action was taken. As a result, the veteran received both the moving truck and help packing from 10 different First District Legion posts, some from more than 80 miles away. And the work of the First District Legion Family may have also saved a life in the process.

"We all work together. We all communicate with each other," McLaughlin said of the First District. "We all help each other, that is what The American Legion is

supposed to be. The coordination of helping this one veteran was a piece of cake. It touched my heart, there's no doubt about it."

The veteran already had paid for a 26-foot-long U-Haul, but it wasn't close to being big enough to hold all of his possessions, so Post 24 paid for a second U-Haul. And with all the 19 Legion Family members chipping in, everything was packed up in three and a half hours.

"Michael told me over the phone that when he met the (veteran), he was done. His state of depression ... he was at his lowest point," McLaughlin said. "The man's beaten cancer a couple times, so he's not had an easy life. So honest to God, when we showed up that morning ... it made a difference.

"Mike Metzner, he looked at me and said, 'Today we saved a life, boss.' And I said, 'Yes sir, we did.' We're here to help. We're here to be the one."

The veteran's son found him a piece of property in Tennessee to relocate to. And when it comes time to unpack the trailers, The American Legion will be there to assist.

In Tennessee's Third District, Bradley County Post 81 Adjutant Dwight Woodcock said Legionnaires stand ready to assist when the veteran is ready to move into his new residence. "His U-Hauls are in Chattanooga," Woodcock said. "They're waiting to be unloaded as soon as we get the word. We don't kick it down the road. Someone's got to be in charge in real-time."

In addition to serving in multiple American Legion positions, Woodcock also is a mentor within the Tennessee Veterans Treatment Court system. Assisting veterans through the court "is how we change the world and be the one. At least for me it is," Woodcock said. "I'm just doing what I can in Southeast Tennessee."

NEC-approved resolutions focus on mental health

The American Legion National Executive Committee passed several resolutions during its annual Fall Meetings Oct. 11-12 in Indianapolis at National Headquarters. All approved resolutions will soon be made available in the <u>Digital Archive</u>. The following are a few that focus on the Legion's Be the One suicide prevention mission, Legion accredited service officers and transitioning servicemembers. **Resolution No. 9: Department of Veterans Affairs S.A.V.E. Training at Posts.** The origin of this resolution is from the Department of New York, as VA S.A.V.E. training has been held at the post, district and department level in support of the Legion's <u>Be the One</u> suicide-prevention mission to save the lives of veterans and destigmatize asking for mental health support. The acronym stands for:

- **S** Signs of suicidal thinking should be recognized.
- **A** Ask the most important question of all, "Are you thinking of killing yourself?"
- **V** Validate the veteran's experience.
- **E** Encourage treatment and expedite getting help.

Resolution No. 9 strongly encourages American Legion posts to host VA S.A.V.E. training classes and to invite local community, government agencies, notfor-profits, and businesses to participate in the training.

American Legion posts interested in hosting a VA S.A.V.E. training class can facilitate it through their local VA Medical Center's suicide-prevention team. A post can locate contact information for their local suicide prevention team through the <u>Veterans Crisis Line</u> <u>Resource using this link</u>. Once on the website, enter a ZIP code and press search. Then select the box next to Suicide Prevention Coordinators and press search again. Once completed, you will be provided with the closest suicide prevention coordinator and their contact information.

The NEC also passed **Resolution No. 5**, which calls on Congress to pass legislation funding continued research of emerging therapies, such as MDMA, Ibogaine, 5-MeO-DMT and psilocybin, to address veteran suicides, and for VA to conduct research on these

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emerging therapies and funding and training of VA clinicians on safe administration.

Resolution No. 10: Oppose Claims Reviews by Private Companies. Legislation currently pending in Congress, Preserving Lawful Utilization of Services for Veterans Act (PLUS Act) proposes amendments to Title 38 of the United States Code to allow private companies, including foreign-owned entities, to handle the review of claims for benefits under laws administered by the VA Secretary. The American Legion has concern regarding the protection and security of sensitive data and medical information of military veterans and believes government entities responsible for reviewing claims for benefits possess the necessary expertise, understanding and accountability to serve the unique needs and circumstances of military veterans.

Resolution No. 10 affirms the Legion's stance that only properly trained VA-accredited representatives should be authorized to file initial claims, and it urges Congress to pass legislation to restore criminal penalties for persons or companies, including those with foreign ownership, violating VA rules regarding representing or charging veteran fees to file, prepare or prosecute initial VA claims without VA accreditation. The resolution also urges Congress to fully fund and support VA staffing for the enforcement of criminal penalties, as well as for oversight of new VA-accredited persons and companies; and it urges VA and Congress to support the efforts of VA-approved and accredited organizations like The American Legion so they can ensure veterans and their families continue to receive free representation when filing a VA benefits claim. Resolution No. 13: Transition Assistance Program App. An estimated 200,000 servicemembers separate from the military every year, and while active duty servicemembers must begin Transition Assistance Program (TAP) no later than 365 days before separation or retirement, the Government Accountability Office found in its December 2022 report that 70% of transitioning servicemembers did not start TAP at least 365 days in advance. And the report showed 25% of servicemembers requiring maximum transition support did not attend a two-day individual training track or were waived from attending by unit leaders.

In Resolution No. 13, The American Legion "urges Congress to direct all federal executive branch agencies involved in the Transition Assistance Program to establish a private-public partnership to create a transition app with an artificial intelligence component;" and that the app equip active-duty servicemembers and veterans with the necessary information on the resources and benefits available to them.

In line with TAP, the NEC passed **Resolution No. 6**, which "urges Congress to mandate that separating servicemembers utilizing Department of Defense mental health services who find themselves in need of additional support post-transition are made eligible to use the Veterans Health Administration behavioral and mental health services for up to 12 months from their date of separation, with the first six months of copay requirements waived."

The 2023 Samsung American Legion Scholarship recipients have been named. The 86 scholarship recipients – who attended either the 2022 Ameri-

can Legion Boys State or Auxiliary Girls State session – were selected by The American Legion's Committee on Youth Education during the organization's annual Fall Meetings in Indianapolis, Oct. 7. The Samsung American Legion Scholarship awarded 10 national scholars with \$10,000, 10 runners-up with \$5,000, and 71 state finalists each will receive \$1,250 for undergraduate study.

The recipients earned the award based on several criteria, including participation in the 2023 session of American Legion Boys State or Auxiliary Girls State, and being a direct descendant of a wartime veteran eligible for American Legion membership.

The Samsung American Legion Scholarship is available for high school juniors who participate in the current session of Boys State or Girls State and are direct descendants (or legally adopted children) of wartime veterans eligible for American Legion membership. The Samsung scholarship supports undergraduate studies (e.g., room and board, tuition, and books), and each applicant is selected according to his or her involvement in school and community activities, academic record, and financial need.

Honoring repatriated Vietnam War Air Force pilot: 'This is what we do'

One of the missions of The American Legion is to work toward achieving a full accounting of all POW/MIAs from the Gulf War, Vietnam War, Cold War, Korean War and World War II. This means returning living POWs, the repatriation of their remains, or finding convincing evidence why neither of these is possible. And once a former POW or MIA is accounted for and returned home to a final resting place, members of the American Legion Family often are among those welcoming that former servicemember home.

Such was the case on Oct. 10, when Legion Family members from across North Carolina descended upon the town of Waynesville for the funeral of former Vietnam War MIA Capt. Fred M. Hall. A U.S. Air Force pilot, the then 25-year-old Hall was shot down during a mission in Quàng Nam Province in 1969. His crash site wasn't located until 1995, and it wasn't until last March that he was identified – more than 54 years after the F-4 Phantom he served as navigator on crashed.

With the Great Smoky and Blue Ridge Mountains as the backdrop, Legion Honor Guards stood near Hall's gravesite in Green Hill Cemetery, as other Legionnaires, American Legion Auxiliary members, Sons of The American Legion and American Legion Riders helped stage a flag line that the caisson and riderless horse passed by as it reached its final stop. Hall was born and raised in Waynesville and was buried with full military honors near his parents' graves.



"This is what we do. We're supposed to follow our preamble to our constitution by remembering all incidents of our associations in the great wars," said Legionnaire Jim McGill, the past North Carolina American Legion Division V commander and the department commander's representative to the American Legion Riders for the department. "More importantly, at every American Legion event, we have the remembrance of the POW/MIA chair and the ceremony before every meeting. There's no better way to honor it than by coming out and showing support as these soldiers, sailors, airmen, and Marines are returned back to their country from foreign soil."

A member of American Legion Post 104 in Sylva and the organizer for the Legion's efforts to honor Hall, McGill was one of a handful of North Carolina American Legion Riders who helped escort Hall's remains from the Greenville-Spartanburg International Airport in South Carolina to Waynesville two days before the funeral.

"This is the second escort that I've done," McGill said. "It's always a great event. It's ... again showing support for the fallen. It's about escorting and remembering and celebrating the life (of the servicemember)." Honor guards from various posts, including Post 47 in Waynesville – which hosted a reception for Legion Family members following the funeral – and Macon Post 108 in Franklin, stood near Hall's grave.

Brian Morin, a member of Post 47's honor guard and a U.S. Navy veteran, said being able to welcome Hall home was "an awesome feeling." He noted that Hall was missing longer than Morin had been alive.

"I'm 52 years old, and I respect these Vietnam vets and World War II vets. I respect all military," Morin said. "I joined the service because I love my loved ones back home. I'm on the honor guard so I can honor my fellow vets."

Department Chaplain Monica Lockwood, a U.S. Marine Corps veteran and member of American Legion Post 82 in Shelby, drove more than two hours to attend the funeral.

"It's to give honor to a veteran who was found ... and put to rest in his city," Lockwood said. "It's an awesome experience. I belong to three different honor guards, so serving a veteran that is deceased is my honor and privilege. And the family (of the veteran) appreciates it so much."

North Carolina Division V Commander Wayne Mihelich, a member of Post 29 in Lenoir, also was in attendance out of a sense of obligation to Hall and his surviving family. "It's the right thing to do," he said. "We're here today to remember him, to pay homage to what he did for our nation, and also to show his family that we've never forgotten about him, and so we're here at the end, also."

The strong showing by the Legion Family provided an opportunity to continue to make the general public aware of the more than 81,000 U.S. servicemembers still listed as missing in action since World War II.

"Unfortunately, too many people don't know what our military is," Mihelich said. "By us getting together here to honor this gentleman ... it reminds everyone of what he did, and of what this station stands for. And what we veterans stand for. Because we never leave those who have fallen in action behind. We always bring them home, and that's what we're doing. And to show younger generations how important this is, because some just don't understand."

Mihelich helped do the latter by bringing with him the West Caldwell Navy JROTC Color Guard, which won first place in the 2023 American Legion National Convention's Color Guard contest in the NJROTC

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Open Division. Members of the color guard also stood near Hall's gravesite during the funeral.

"I brought them so that they can see what we do, what this is all about," Mihelich said. "And also, to honor the ideals of what this nation stands for, and the captain and his family as they bring him to his final resting place."

How the ALA Junior Patch Program Benefits Our Younger Members

There are several ways American Legion Auxiliary (ALA) Juniors and Sons of The American Legion (SAL) youth members can be active participants of The American Legion Family. One route is through the Patch Program. Regardless of residency and whether she/he belongs to a unit or squadron, Junior Auxiliary members and SAL youth members can serve their communities and veterans, and learn about patriotism, health, fitness, and leadership through this program.

There are three levels of patch criteria:

- Red Level 1: Kindergarten through third grade
- Gold Level 2: Fourth grade through eighth grade
- Blue Level 3: Ninth grade through 12th grade (or 18 years old)



Juniors can earn a wide variety of patches through this program.

A special Junior patch has been created for our Junior members and SAL youth to help raise money for the National Presidents' Scholarship Fund.

We hope every Junior and SAL youth will be involved in some activity to raise money for scholarships, which are funded by the Educating Children of Warriors Fund.

Any Junior or SAL youth can earn this patch by raising at least \$5 for each year of their age. For example, a 17-year-old would raise a minimum of \$85 ($17 \times 5 = 85).

Money can be raised in a variety of ways. Juniors and SAL youth can solicit donations from family, friends, Legion Family members, or contribute themselves. They can coordinate fundraising activities such as bake sales. Funds can be raised individually or as a group, but each Junior or SAL youth receiving this patch needs to have raised the required minimum funds for their age. The goal is for the youth of our organization to be involved and aware of the scholarship project. Checks should be made out to *National Treasurer, American Legion Auxiliary* with *National Presidents' Scholarship* in the memo line. Here are a few examples of the criteria for patches, depending on the grade level:

Red (kindergarten through third grade)

Americanism: Educate yourself about the rights and responsibilities of an American citizen. Must complete three of eight activities. Required: Learn and lead the Pledge of Allegiance at a meeting or your school.

Activities to choose from include enter the Americanism Essay Contest for your age group, draw the American flag and identify the proper number of stars and stripes, or study the history of Independence Day and tell an adult what it means to you.

Gold (fourth through eighth grade)

Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation: We assist and enhance the lives of those who have served our country. Must complete six of nine activities. Required: Send eight greeting cards to hospitalized or ill veterans and research three other organizations that help veterans.

Activities to choose from include volunteer to help a veteran or their family with yard work or chores, participate

in a stand down for homeless veterans in your community or participate in a special holiday program for veterans through your school, unit, or church.

Blue (ninth through 12th grade)

Education: Educate yourself about the rights and responsibilities of an American citizen. Must complete nine of 12 activities. Required: Tutor another student or adult on an educational topic (reading, math, history, or another subject) for a minimum of five hours, raise \$25 for the National Presidents' Scholarship, and read a minimum of five novels or five non-fiction books during the school year and provide a written log of the books you have read.

Activities to choose from include work with your teacher(s) to invite a veteran into your classroom, volunteer to help in an after-school reading program or organize a patriotic activity in your community in collaboration with The American Legion Family, mayor, or others.





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Dave was born on Feb. 14, 1943, in Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, to Vivian (Kelto) and Walter Paynter. He moved to Bessemer as an infant.

Dave attended school in Bessemer and graduated from A.D. Johnston High School in 1962. He worked at Indianhead Ski Resort before the hill was first opened. He learned to operate heavy equipment during the hill construction.

Dave enlisted in the U.S. Army on Nov. 3, 1964. He became an aircraft mechanic and crew chief with the 92nd Aviation Company and flew with his assigned plane into Special Forces camps in Vietnam.

Dave was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for an act of heroism on Dec. 16, 1965, while serving in the Vietnam War. The Distinguished Flying Cross is awarded for true gallantry and selfless action in combat against an armed enemy force. Dave was honorably discharged on Sept. 13, 1966. He was proud of his military service and encouraged students to consider the military for direction in life.

Upon his discharge from the Army, Dave attended Gogebic Community College in Ironwood. He also attended Northern Michigan University in Marquette, where he graduated with a degree in industrial arts.

During his 27-year teaching career, Dave taught woodshop, metal shop, drafting, mechanical drawing, math and driver's education for the Wakefield Public Schools. He also served as the Wakefield High School Ski Team coach. He retired from teaching in 1998. Dave often said that the greatest rewards of his teaching career were the friendships he made with students and the impact that his students had on his life. Dave enjoyed seeing his former students out in the community and hearing their life stories.

Dave was a skilled carpenter. He shared his talent with his children, teaching them much more than basic carpentry skills. He was a humble, compassionate, kind, and helpful man. He was so very proud of his kids and their life accomplishments and expressed his pride often.

Dave worked at Powderhorn, Indianhead and Blackiack Ski Resorts as a ski instructor and, after retiring from teaching, as a chair lift operator. His cheery "good morning" greeted many skiers. He was a member of Sharon Lutheran Church in Bessemer, where he served on the church council for a number of years. He also served on the Gogebic County Federal Credit Union board for several years. He was a lifetime member of the Bessemer American Legion Post 27 and Bessemer Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 3673, was a volunteer driver for the local Disabled American Veterans' chapter and a dedicated member of the local military honor guard. Dave was instrumental in establishing the Sons of the American Legion Squadron 27 in Bessemer. He was honored to serve on the construction and set up crew for the Vietnam Moving Wall display in Bessemer, in 2008. Dave loved music and played the bass horn in Marty's Goldenaires for 32 vears.

Dave married Kathryn "Kathy" Adams on Jan. 31, 1981, at Sharon Lutheran Church. He often told his kids that Kathy was the love of his life.

Dave is survived by his wife of 42 years, Kathryn Paynter; his children, Kristy (Paul) Recla, Ironwood, Craig Paynter, Bessemer, and Kari (Luke) Spaete, Duluth, Minnesota; his grandchildren, Mason (Kaitlyn) Recla, Logan Recla, Nora Spaete, Casey (Cole) LaBeske, Tyler (Megan) Paynter and Amanda (Mike Lotzer) Paynter; 10 great-grandchildren; two sisters, Luetta Flaa, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and Ruth (David) Ruff, Marquette; his sisterin-law, Sue Paynter, of Vermont; three brothers-in-law, Greg (Barb) Adams and Bob Adams, both of Ramsay, and Rick Adams, Bellaire, Michigan; and many nieces, nephews and cousins. Papa Dave also enjoyed spending time with his "bonus" grandkids, Amber, Ben, Jake, Joey, Owen, Kaylea, Anna and L2. He will be remembered by a long list of lifelong friends. Dave was preceded in death by his parents; a son, Lee David Paynter; a granddaughter, Judi Paynter; two brothers, James "Tiny" Paynter, and Ron Paynter; his father-in-law and mother-inlaw, Louis "Ike" and Beverly Adams: and two brothers-in-law. 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Honor on the move

On Aug. 4, Westchester County, N.Y., rededicated a set of World War I memorial trees and plaques at the county center in White Plains. The memorial has been moved around in its century-plus history, but the local American Legion post has stood up for it every step of the way.

According to Post 135 Commander Dan Griffin, the rededication came three years after the memorial's most recent move, when it was uprooted by the State of New York in 2020 so the center and parking lot – which the



memorial rings - could be used for temporary medical facilities during the COVID-19 pandemic. The post played an important role in getting the memorial restored, partially through Griffin's other role as service officer at the county Veterans Service Agency.

The whole history of Post 135 and the memorial are commingled. According to a report by WRRV, post founder and first commander Frederick Gross "spearheaded" the creation of the memorial. It was dedicated on Armistice Day 1921 (the post received its initial charter in July 1919), with a parade featuring World War I, Spanish-American War and Civil War veterans. A box of Belleau Wood soil was mixed with the soil at the memorial.

In 1931, the memorial was rededicated after its first move, to make way for the new county center; Post 135 assisted with that as well. The 2023 rededication included the reading of the 49 names included on the 49 plaques, some by Griffin. An additional historical project of his has been helping restore a cannon from USS Maine for display. "People are trying to eliminate history," he said, "and I'm trying to keep it out."

The American Legion changes and saves lives

Less than two weeks ago, there was the possibility of another government shutdown where funding for troops, border patrol and other vital government services would come to a halt.

During the last government shutdown in 2019, the U.S. Coast Guard continued to report for duty while their paychecks were stopped, but The American Legion stepped up and provided more than \$1 million in Temporary Financial Assistance to Coast Guard families in need. "Incredibly, Congress still has not passed legislation to pay the Coast Guard if a shutdown occurs before the passage of a Homeland Security appropriation. And this year we faced – and still face – the possibility that no branch of the U.S. military would have its members paid on time," said National Commander Daniel J. Seehafer to members of the National Executive Committee on Oct. 11 during Fall Meetings in Indianapolis at National Headquarters.

"While we certainly dodged a bullet on September 30, we are definitely not out of the woods. The current funding only runs through November 17. While VA assures the public that it will continue to provide health care and other essential services, Secretary Denis McDonough said at a press conference on September 22 that there would be no outreach. Again, no outreach. We should be thankful that VA's first National Buddy Check occurs next week (Oct. 16-20) – before another potential shutdown.

"We know that outreach saves lives. That's the whole purpose of our Buddy Checks and any peer-wellness program for that matter. The numbers may not yet show it, but the progress that has been made toward removing the stigma and raising awareness about veteran suicide in recent years has been monumental. And family, we can't stop. Not now, not ever."

Although VA went on the record in September saying that the Veterans Crisis Line and essential health care services will not be impacted during a government shutdown, "we do know that the added anxiety that comes with a shutdown is something that veterans do not need.

"It is Congress that has the constitutionally mandated responsibility to pass a budget, it is the president who has the constitutionally mandated responsibility to sign a budget and it is The American Legion's constitutionally protected right to raise heck when they don't. If there is a shutdown, we really need to apply the pressure that Congress passes a Pay Our Troops Act, one that will ensure our military and our Coast Guard are paid throughout the duration." Seehafer encouraged Legionnaires to <u>sign up for the Legion's Grassroots Action Center alerts</u> to stay informed on legislative issues that The American Legion supports. "Let's make our voice known every single day."

Seehafer added that a "gridlock in Washington is never good but particularly dangerous when our strong ally, Israel, is engaged in a full war against Hamas terrorists. We know the impact that the 9/11 attacks had on our nation. Ladies and gentlemen, this is exactly why America must always maintain a strong national defense and secure borders."

More than a million PACT Act-related claims have been filed through the middle of September. According to Military.com, one in three of the 570,000 approved claims have come back with zero percent ratings. "It is a safe bet that a good number of the zeropercent ratings and denied claims were not filed with the assistance of an accredited American Legion service officer," Seehafer emphasized. "Doesn't it make sense that a trained expert – and that's what our service officers are – be at the side of the veteran or the surviving family member as they navigate this complicated process? Not a shark. Not a predator, but instead a lifesaver, a buddy, a true friend as they know how to navigate this complicated process.

The Legion's service officers are specially trained to provide expert assistance, free of charge, to veterans and their families as they navigate the VA claims process. For assistance in filing a VA claim, <u>contact a Legion service officer</u>. And it is The American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation help make their work possible through training "that changes lives and saves live," Seehafer said. "I just know that I can count on each of you and your departments to continue to support this essential American Legion program with a financial gift."

Seehafer also addressed the Legion's new Base Assessment and Servicemember Experience program – BASE – that aims to address quality of life matters that affect service members and their families. National staff will visit military installations to hear from servicemembers about areas of concern – housing and barracks, health care, day care, spousal employment opportunities, education, mental health, food, financial insecurity, commissary, and exchange access, and more.

"We are not trying to fill the role of an Inspector General, but we are veteran advocates, and we offer a

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wealth of experience on what works well and what doesn't," Seehafer said regarding the BASE program. "We can carry the concerns and messages of the military community directly to Congress and the White House. Informed advocates are effective advocates!

"When I think of the many great programs that have been generated in this very room (the NEC Room at National Headquarters), it strengthens my belief, my conviction, and my resolve that The American Legion truly changes lives and saves lives. That family is not just rhetoric. That is reality. Therefore, let's show the world who we truly are and what membership in The American Legion really means. And that's service. Service that changes lives and saves lives.

"We continue to change and save lives with a mission like Be the One. Be the One. Saving one veteran, or even their family member, one at a time. Now that's The American Legion. That is you. And even me."

For Idaho post, every week is Buddy Check Week

The members of American Legion Post 113 in Meridian, Idaho, made Buddy Check calls on fellow veterans in the past. But when a post member died by suicide, the membership knew something needed to change.

That led to the post starting its duty office program in September. From 10 a.m.-2 p.m. on weekdays, a member volunteers to come to the post to make Buddy Check calls from a database of members. That will continue next week during the Department of Veterans Affairs <u>National Buddy Check Week</u>, when veterans are asked to make a pledge to contact up to 10 of their battle buddies and friends from service, as well as complete peer wellness, resiliency and S.A.V.E. suicide prevention training.

"We've had one suicide that could have been prevented had we gotten to the guy in time," Post 113 Chaplain and First Vice Commander Dan Pruett said. "It just kind of kicked us in the butt and said to us that this is really important. We really need to put an effort into this. Now it's going really good." As members make the Buddy Check call, they update the list they are using. Those members who asked to not be called again are taken off the list.

But Pruett said the Buddy Check calls he's made have been met with positive responses. "They're very appreciative," he said. "They think, 'Boy, I didn't know you were going to do this. It was a call out of the blue.' And they like that."

Department of Mexico to change name

American Legion posts within the Department of Mexico voted during its 2023 department convention to change its name to the Department of Latin America. Resolution No. 16 requesting this name change was brought forth to the National Executive Committee Oct. 11 during the Legion's Fall Meetings, and it was passed.

The resolution states that "the Department of Mexico has developed American Legion posts in the sovereign countries of Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Cost Rica, Panama, Columbia, Ecuador and Argentina," and these countries "identify themselves as Latin America countries.

"The name change would greatly enhance the Department of Mexico's ability to recruit new members and

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start new posts in countries south of the Rio Grande by giving them an identity" that they can identify with.

12 CENTCOM posts affected by Tuberville block could hamper US aid to Israel, lawmakers say

Twelve senior military positions that help lead U.S. forces in the Middle East are caught in Sen. Tommy Tuberville's hold on military nominees, and some law-makers fear the understaffing will impact U.S. support to Israel.

The posts in U.S. Central Command, including the deputy commander and the commander of the Navy's 5th Fleet, are either being held by temporary commanders, junior officers or officers doing two jobs at once, said Sen. Mark Kelly, D-Ariz.

"As we reposition our own forces and support our ally Israel with intelligence, logistics and other assistance, we need U.S. leadership to be as strong and focused as possible," Kelly, a former naval aviator, said Thursday. "This hamstrings our regional military leadership during a crisis. Period."

Kelly is the latest lawmaker to lash out at Tuberville, R-Ala., for retaining his hold on more than 300 general and flag officers as Israel goes to war against the Hamas-ruled Gaza Strip in retaliation for the deadliest attack on Israel in more than 50 years.

Tuberville instituted his block in February to push the Pentagon into dropping its abortion access policy for service members. He said Sunday that he will not back down even as the U.S. surges warships and aircraft to the Middle East to back up Israel and prevent the fighting from spiraling into a broader conflict. "The holds are not affecting our military readiness and they are certainly not affecting the readiness of other countries," Steven Stafford, Tuberville's spokesman, said Thursday.

Stafford did not comment on whether Tuberville will try to force individual votes on any of the affected Central Command positions when the Senate returns from recess next week.

Tuberville's attempt to bring the nomination of Gen. Eric Smith, the Marine Corps commandant, to a standalone vote last month prompted the Democratled Senate to confirm Smith and two other positions on the Joint Chiefs of Staff individually in a process that spread over two days. The Senate typically speeds through groups of military nominations via unanimous voice votes.

The Middle East-related positions affected by Tuberville's hold include the CENTCOM deputy director for strategy, plans and policy, the deputy commander and reserve vice commander of U.S. Naval Forces in CENT-COM, the deputy commander of U.S. Air Forces Central, the commander of the 380th Air Expeditionary Wing, the commanding general of the I Marine Expeditionary Force, the commanding general of the 1st Sustainment Command, the assistant division commander of the 1st Marine Division and the defense attaches to Israel and Iraq, according to Kelly.

Jonathan Lord, director of the Middle East security program at the Center for a New American Security, a centrist Washington think tank with ties to the Pentagon, said the positions are all important for maintenance, logistics, readiness, and sustainment of U.S. forces and for planning military operations.

"These are all critical roles on any given day, but with the U.S. supporting Israel in this moment of crisis with a whole host of possible contingencies that could stem from that, this is not the time to be understaffed," he said.

John Kirby, the White House National Security Council spokesman, said Thursday that there are no plans to put American troops on the ground as Israel prepares a likely ground invasion of Gaza, where a handful of Americans are believed to be held hostage.

But the U.S. military has shored up support for Israel in other ways, deploying the USS Gerald R. Ford carrier strike group to the Eastern Mediterranean a day after Hamas militants attacked Israel on Saturday. A second U.S. carrier strike group bound for the region is set to depart Friday from Norfolk, Va.

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A small group of American special operations forces are also assisting Israel's military with planning and intelligence, according to Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin.

Sen. Tammy Duckworth, D-Ill., said CENTCOM officers who should be helping the U.S. military response are "unable to do so as a result of Sen. Tuberville's oneman political blockade."

"It has never been clearer that he is singlehandedly threatening our military's readiness and global stability," Duckworth, a former Army helicopter pilot, said in a statement. "As has been true for months, he must lift his hold immediately so that our military can wield the full range of our nation's capabilities as it works to support our Israeli allies."

It is not clear if the Senate will act on any of the CENT-COM nominees next week, though Sen. Tim Kaine, D-Va., said pressure is mounting to break Tuberville's hold. Two positions on the Joint Chiefs, the chief of naval operations and the Air Force chief of staff, are included in the stalled nominations.

"When we get back, I think you're going to see this ice jam break and we're going to start to confirm our military," Kaine said this week in an MSNBC interview.

Lord, a former staff member for the House Armed Services Committee, said it will be difficult for the public to discern the effects of Tuberville's hold on the Middle East though that does not mean the military is not having to navigate hurdles and obstacles as a result of the block.

"The U.S. military is going to overcome and adapt to provide everything it needs to our close partner Israel," he said. "It is unclear to me that from the outside looking in, you're going to see any deficiency, but that is a testament to the U.S. military and not to the unimportance of these holds and the damage that they're doing to the processes and the leadership of the force."

In the previous years, Detachments have placed their wreaths at various areas in Washington DC, that the National Organization received from the American Legion Family and many tourists have made positive statements seeing the wreaths from Detachments placed around the Washington area. We feel that this is a very positive outcome and are recommending any Detachment wishing to lay a wreath or have a wreath laid for them in the Washington area to continue.

At Arlington National cemetery we will be going to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. The tomb is a walk uphill from the visitor center and you may walk or take the tram. The tram fee purchased that day is **\$19.50**. This year we are again adding an offer to purchase your tickets for the Tram ride to the Tomb of The Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery in advance to speed up the process of getting to the Tomb of The Unknown Soldier quicker. Group rate for the Tram ride is **\$15.50** each. If you would like to be included, fill it in on the form and we will purchase group rate tickets. Veterans can get a cheaper rate but MUST purchase on your own with qualified ID, we cannot purchase them for you.
