900 US troops deploying to Middle East to support Israel, add stability, Pentagon says

Almost 1,000 American troops have received orders to deploy to the Middle East to support Israel in its conflict with Hamas and provide stability in the region, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin decided several days ago to put 2,000 troops on pre-deployment orders to prepare for possible missions in the Middle East. On Thursday, the Pentagon said some of those orders have been activated.

"Approximately 900 troops have ... deployed or are in the process of deploying," said Air Force Brig. Gen Pat Ryder, the Pentagon's top spokesman. "These include forces that have been on prepare-to-deploy orders, and which are deploying from the continental United States."

Ryder said the deploying troops are part of existing plans that were previously announced to send a Terminal High-Altitude Area Defense battery from Fort Bliss, Texas, and Patriot batteries from Fort Sill, Okla. Patriot and Avenger batteries are also being sent from Fort Liberty, N.C., and Associated Air Defense headquarters elements from Fort Bliss and Fort Cavazos, Texas.

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THAAD is an air defense system that can intercept short-, medium- and long-range ballistic missiles with radar and shoot them down. Patriot and Avenger systems work in a similar way.

Ryder declined to say specifically where the deploying U.S. forces are going.

"I can confirm they are not going to Israel," he said. "They are intended to support regional deterrence efforts and further bolster U.S. force protection capabilities."

The Pentagon said the number of U.S. service members who have pre-deployment orders might fluctuate depending on what is needed in the region, which has seen a severe increase of violence since Hamas militants on Oct. 7 broke through a border fence between Gaza and Israel and killed hundreds of Israeli civilians. Israel's military has been carrying out airstrikes on Gaza in retaliation, which have killed scores of Palestinian civilians.

Ryder said the Pentagon is also sending two Iron Dome batteries to Israel. Iron Dome is a sophisticated air-defense system that tracks incoming enemy rockets and knocks them out of the sky. Since the Oct. 7 attack, Israel has intercepted dozens of rockets using Iron Dome batteries.

The two batteries had been assigned to the Army at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Wash., but will now be transferred to Israel. The Pentagon has said previously that it's been sending Iron Dome interceptors to Israel.

John Alvin Bergmann



John Alvin Bergmann, 102, of Upper Arlington, Ohio, departed his earthly home surrounded by his loving family on Friday, May 12, 2023 to be with his Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Born in Chicago, Illinois, on July 6, 1920, he was the son of Rose (Nelson) Bergmann Hultberg and John Charles

Bergmann; and Godson of Lillian (Bergmann) and Alvin John Appel. He graduated from South Hills High School and the University of Pittsburgh, majoring in accounting and mathematics. In 1941, he was recruited by President Roosevelt's staff to serve in the army as a German and Japanese code breaker. John traveled the world and worked as a liaison between the American codebreakers and Bletchley Park. After his honorable discharge in 1945, he created a home in Pittsburgh with his wife, Lois, and their twin daughters and started his career in the coal mining industry. The family relocated to Columbus, Ohio where his third daughter was born and found their lifelong home in Upper Arlington.

Retiring early from South-East Coal Sales Company in 1983, he spent the next 15 years of his life by his wife's side taking care of her during her battle with Parkinson's disease. He dedicated every moment to Lois and kept her home surrounded by family until her passing in 1998. After her passing, John joined the Upper Arlington Senior Center where he met other Veterans and became the chair of the Veteran's Discussion Group for 15 years. He served on the senior advisory council and participated in the Tremont school Lunch Buddies program. Every day he would have lunch at the senior center, welcoming new members and helping them get adjusted. His lunch table, known as the Bergmann Round Table, exists to this day. John's passion in life was traveling across the Columbus area visiting middle and high schools sharing his experiences as a World War II code breaker and mentoring the future generations.

In 2019, he earned the Ford Oval of Honor for outstanding military service and served as a Grand Marshal in the Columbus 4th of July parade. After representing the military as a WWII vet for decades in the Upper Arlington parade, he was named Grand Marshal in 2022. With a theme of Stars, Stripes, and Trailblazers, it was an honorable way to celebrate his 102nd birthday. In his life, John was also a H.S. cheerleader, Eagle Scout, Scoutmaster, 2-year president of the band parent boosters, member of the Disabled American Veterans, Life member of The American Legion Post #442, Parkinson's Society advocate, Honorable Kentucky Colonel, Upper Arlington Senior Citizen Award winner, past member of the Athletic Club, 65 year member of the F. & A. M. lodge #684, Shriner of Aladdin Shriners of Ohio 1963-1996, founding member of Bower Hill Community Church, Pittsburgh Pa., Deacon Covenant Presbyterian Church, Upper Arlington, Ohio, and member of Full Gospel Businessmen. John was more than a military hero, husband, father, grandfather, and great-grandfather. He was a friend to all. He loved to meet new people, learn about them, and share stories. His kindness and interest in others were always on display.

John was preceded in death by the love of his life and wife of 55 years, Lois Elizabeth (Klein) Bergmann. He is survived by his three daughters; Candace (Dr. James) Finn of Powell, Ohio, Sandra (Jack) Stoller of Upper Arlington, Ohio, and Kimberly (Dr. James) Elkovitch of Auburn, New York. Grandchildren J.J. (Lisa) Finn of Powell, Ohio, Kerrie (Ian) Donahue of Barrington, Rhode Island. Dr. Jeffrey (Dawn) Finn of Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania, Tricia (Dave) Kershner of Upper Arlington, Ohio, and Jason Finn of Powell, Ohio. Forever cherished and remembered by his nine great-grandchildren, Jonathan (Haley) and Beth Finn, Megan, and Brian Donahue; Jeffrey, Brennan and Aislinn Finn, Molly and Kate Kershner; as well as numerous nieces, nephews, cousins, and dear friends. His memory will be cherished by all that knew him.

All are welcome to join the Bergmann family for a Memorial Service with United States Army Military Honors on Saturday, November 4th at 2:00 pm at SCHOEDINGER NORTHWEST, 1740 Zollinger Road, Upper Arlington, Ohio with Pastor Chris Martin officiating. Immediately following the service, a Celebration of Life Reception will be held until 5:00 pm to share stories of John's remarkable and wonderful life. How to Be the One for homeless veterans

The American Legion welcomed retired U.S. Marine Sgt. Maj. Dr. Patrick McClellan for its October virtual Training Tuesday session, "Be the One: Helping Our Homeless Veterans." McClellan provided ways American Legion posts can assist homeless veterans through social support, housing, employment, and treatment.

In his opening remarks, McClellan said, "I'm going to be discussing <u>Be the One</u>, but it may not be from the context of what you're familiar with. Most of the time we hear Be the One in the realm of suicide awareness prevention. Be the One can also be part of helping our homeless veterans and connecting our veterans to the resources that are available locally to you.

"We need to capture them (homeless veterans) into our post. Whether this is trying to find out how you can sign them up to become members of the post to help them and guide them to get them back to where they need to be to be productive citizens. This is kind of really the touch point of Be the One as a post and as the Legion. This provides actual tangible results because you get to see it right before your eyes and you get to put an actual person and the name and the face together and say, "This is where they were. This is where they're going to be at. This is where they are now.' That's something that is very fulfilling and that's why I have personally dedicated my life to continue to serve my veteran community."

In his presentation, McClellan provided guidance on how to:

- Understand how no two homeless veterans and their needs are the same.
- Get the veteran into treatment, whether they are eligible for VA assistance or not, and ensure the veteran is able to get to the treatment provided.
- Find shelter, including overcoming barriers to locate housing for homeless veterans.
- Help the veteran gain employment.
- Advocate for homeless veterans at the state and federal level.

Groundbreaking ceremony held for South Youngstown veteran's home

Veteran's Haven, a program of Family & Community Services, is set to begin construction on a container home project at West Warren Avenue and Hillman Street by the end of the year. <u>Alex Kamczyc, WFMJ</u> | October 10, 2023

City officials and developers gathered to break ground for on a new development aimed at helping homeless veterans in the area.

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The \$1.2 million project is expected to be finished by October 2024.

Once completed, the 5,400 square foot facility will offer various Veterans Association services to help homeless veterans get back on their feet. This includes mental health services and programs to get them integrated back into the work force.

The facility will accommodate 14 veterans of various genders and sexual orientations with a private bedroom and bathroom.

According to a news release from Family & Community Services, the facility was made possible through \$600,000 of capital funding from The Department of Veterans Affairs Capital Program, \$150,000 of ARPA funding from The Mahoning County Board of Commissioners, and \$100,000 from the City of Youngstown-Ward One.

Additionally, the Family & Community Services has launched an adopt-a-room program for donors to participate in the creation of the facility.

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

ALWS champs staying in state to visit World Series

The Texas Rangers won't be the only team from the Lone Star State at Globe Life Field in Arlington, Texas, on Saturday.

Players and coaches from the 2023 American Legion World Series champions from League City (Texas) Post 554 will be guests of Major League Baseball at Game 2 of the 119th World Series. Post 554 <u>became</u> <u>the first ALWS champions from the state of</u> <u>Texas</u> with a 1-0 win over Lincoln (Neb.) Post 3 in August in Shelby, N.C.

Earlier in the day, League City players and coaches are scheduled to participate in a Play Ball event at the Texas Rangers MLB Youth Academy. Play Ball is a committed effort to spark widespread participation in all forms of baseball activities among all age groups, especially youth.

The Rangers are seeking their first World Series title in the franchise's third appearance, and first since 2011. Among their key players is 2023 American Legion Baseball Graduate of the Year Corey Seager (Post 115/Kannapolis, N.C.). He's batting .333 with 3 home runs and 6 RBIs this postseason.

Texas will face the Arizona Diamondbacks, who rallied from a 2-0 series deficit to Philadelphia to win the National League Championship Series. This will be Arizona's second World Series appearance; the Diamondbacks won the 2001 title in just their fourth year of existence.

Diamondbacks closer Paul Sewald, <u>who played for the</u> <u>2008 ALWS champions from Las Vegas</u>, has six saves during this year's playoffs — just one shy of tying the record for most saves in a single postseason.

Vietnam Women's Memorial to mark 30th anniversary


To commemorate the 30th anniversary of the dedication of the Vietnam Women's Memorial in Washington, D.C., a weekend of events will honor the 265,000 women veterans – military and civilian – who served during the Vietnam era.

Hosted by Eastern National in coordination with the Vietnam Women's Memorial Advisory Group, the National Park Service and the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, programs will include a candlelight ceremony at 6 p.m. on Nov. 10 and a storytelling program at 10 a.m. on Veterans Day. The weekend will culminate in a 1 p.m. ceremony on Veterans Day at the memorial, where the annual Observance at the Wall will be dedicated to the anniversary.

The keynote speaker will be Diane Carlson Evans, chair of the Vietnam Women's Memorial Advisory Group and founder of the Vietnam Women's Memorial. A former Army combat nurse and Vietnam War veteran, she led a 10-year mission to build the memorial on the National Mall – the first in the nation's capital to recognize the military service of women, as well as the patriotic service of civilian women. In 2021, Carlson Evans <u>received</u> The American Legion's Distinguished Service Medal for her decades of veteran advocacy. She is a life member of Lewis & Clark Post 2 in Helena, Mont.



Anniversary events are open to the public and will be held at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. The candlelight and storytelling programs will take place at the Vietnam Women's Memorial statue, 300 feet from the Wall. U.S. military bases throughout the Middle East continue to see drone and missile attacks from militant groups. Since Oct. 17, there have been 16 missile or drone attacks on American bases – 12 in Iraq and 4 in Syria, where U.S. and coalition forces are fighting terrorist groups such as the Islamic State, Ryder said. The number of attacks was 13 on Tuesday.

One of the latest attacks occurred Thursday at an air base in Erbil in northern Iraq. Ryder said the attack caused no injuries and no significant property damage.

The Pentagon has not identified the groups behind the attacks but has said the militants are supported by Iran and are effectively Iranian proxy groups. The attacks caused almost two dozen injuries in the two countries, Ryder said, including 15 who received some form of traumatic brain injury.

"In all cases, members returned to duty," he said.



Our gravest threat since World War II

October 25, 2023

Dear American Legion Family members and friends,

America is facing its most significant threats since World War II.

That isn't simple conjecture, or a political talking point. Multiple ongoing crises — compounded by the brutal Hamas terrorist attack against innocent men, women, and children in their Israeli homes — bear this out.

While we continue to pray for Israel and especially for our fellow Americans who have lost their lives or are still being held hostage by terrorists, it's become increasingly clear that the world requires leadership to prevent these crises from spiraling into a world war. Among the threats:

- The heartbreaking crisis in Israel created by Hamas terrorists. More than 30 Americans have been killed. American hostages are still fighting for their freedom. And let us not forget the innocent Israeli lives lost in the most barbaric and reprehensible of circumstances.
- The role of Iran and Hezbollah. Iran's role in the Hamas terrorist attack is somewhat unclear but there are likely ties. Hezbollah, a stronger and more dangerous terrorist group than Hamas, is funded by Iran. The implications of Hezbollah and other terrorist organizations becoming more engaged in the war is extremely troubling as it could spread into a larger conflict. "Iran is supporting Russia in Ukraine, and it's supporting Hamas and other terrorist groups in the region," <u>President Biden said last week.</u>
- The targeting of U.S. troops. Anti-American sentiments and threats are growing in the Middle

East just as there is an increase in U.S. troops in harm's way abroad.

- The Russia-China alliance. Russian President Vladimir Putin recently met with Chinese President Xi Jinping to further strengthen their anti-America alliance. In a new Foreign Affairs article, former Defense Secretary Robert Gates argues that both leaders believe America and other big democracies "are past their prime and have entered an irreversible decline." It doesn't take a defense expert to understand that when enemies sniff a weakness, they attack.
- The uncertainty of North Korea. Kim Jong Un, the volatile leader of North Korea, often orders testing of long-range, nuclear-capable missiles. Consider this from the article by Gates: in just two years, Russia, China, Iran, and North Korea combined will have twice as many nuclear weapons as America.



Let me be clear: we are not in the business of fear mongering. America remains the safest nation on earth, and we have your service to thank for that.

While the United States plays an important role in deterring the next world war, America needs steadfast leadership from its elected representatives in Washington, D.C., to ensure our nation's security from overseas threats.

These volatile situations are coalescing at a time when our Congress is engaged in politics over working for the good of the nation. The failure of the U.S. House to elect its speaker and the potential for a government shutdown in a matter of weeks is deeply troubling. It is imperative that the House of Representatives immediately push aside politics and elect a speaker so they may act against these threats.

Let's be steadfast in our support for America. Lend our voices to the chorus of those voicing support for our military. Call on Congress to lead, not squabble. And, most of all, join me in praying for the safety of our servicemembers — and their families — who are defending our nation as this cacophony of alarm bells grows even louder.

Legionnaires make the call during Buddy Check Week

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) first <u>National</u> <u>Buddy Check Week</u> kicked off Oct. 16 and ran five days, during which veterans were encouraged by VA to reach out to 10 fellow veterans.

The week was based on The American Legion's <u>Buddy</u> <u>Check program</u> started in 2019, which has resulted in well over 1 million veterans being checked on by members of the Legion Family. So, it's of little surprise how busy members of the Legion were during Buddy Check Week.

Paid-Up-For-Life member and six-time Gold Brigader Mary Jane Fisher, a member of American Legion Post 149 in Escondido, Calif., and an administrator of the American Legion Friends Facebook group, reported members of the group made more than 2,600 phone calls over the course of the week. Fisher herself made 150 of those.

"I utilized past rosters and the Messenger calling feature," Fisher said. "The most common response was from individuals who were glad to receive the call. As I asked about their concerns and how their family was doing, many veterans stated they were concerned about living paycheck to paycheck. Example conversations where they had mounting credit card debt and felt like they needed relief. Several (were) concerned about being at risk of being homeless.

"The majority stated they had been denied service-connected conditions and need help with navigating the claims process. The second-highest concern was the lack of service officers available to help them. The third concern was the overall lack of healthcare for the rural communities, and fourth concern was they wished Buddy Checks would happen more often as they feel alone and no support."

Fisher said she suggested multiple resources to those with needs while vowing to call them back and "inviting them to contact me anytime for resources and information."

Throughout the week, Legionnaires posted on social media updates on their Buddy Check efforts, as well as having received calls from a fellow veteran. Department of Utah Commander <u>Ninzel Rasmuson</u> noted, "I received a text message out of the blue from a new Legionnaire friend I met last week at Fall Meetings. The Buddy Check text began as, 'BUDDY CHECK, Sister!!!

I hope all is well with you and family and you made it back safely.' It meant so much to me that a peer had reached out to me to make sure I was ok and safe. Buddy Checks matter!"

Amanda Jones, commander of American Legion Post 30 in Alaska, posted photos of her 5-year-old daughter, American Legion Auxiliary Junior member Charlee, wearing an American Legion Be the One t-shirt and shared, "It's Buddy Check week and we are embracing it as a family!! Charlee has called 3 veterans to see how they're doing and lifted their spirits. Every ONE can make a difference. Be the ONE."

Lou Neubecker, a PUFL member of Post 99 and Sons of The American Legion Squadron 99 in Seaside, Ore., made 25 former Legionnaires. "They were happy to receive my call, and several of them said they were gonna rejoin," Neubecker wrote on Facebook.

Past Department of Ohio American Legion Auxiliary Historian Tsi Sim Mar, a member of Unit 535 in Bellville, Ohio, and an administrator on the American Legion Friends group, also made Buddy Checks. "The response from our veterans was well received," she wrote. "Most of them were surprised to get the call. They had a chance to talk about what they are doing, how they are feeling, and what we could do for them. It was surely well worth it for sure."

Former American Legion Legislative associate Advaith Thampi made 22 Buddy Checks during the week, while American Legion Department of South Dakota Commander Courtney Steffen made 13 and also shared valuable Buddy Check info on Facebook, including links to both the Legion's and VA's Buddy Checks resources, and a link to veteran service officers in her state.

And on Legiontown, <u>past Department of Connecticut</u> <u>Commander and current Department Service Officer</u> <u>K. Robert Lewis shared</u> that Vincent Melesko, a member of Turner-Tinker Post 128 in Niantic, reached out to every member of the post recently, providing those who needed it contact info for an American Legion service officer.

"For World War II, Korea, and Vietnam veteran members he called three times. If no answer, Vinny turned to email and snail mail," Lewis wrote. "He contacted each with a message: 'I'm contacting you to see if you or your family are OK and if there is anything the Niantic American Legion can assist you or your family with. Your fellow Legionnaires are always here for you.""

And at American Legion Post 113 in Meridian, Idaho – <u>which implemented a daily Buddy Check program in</u> <u>September</u> – Legionnaires manned the phones daily for four hours to check on their fellow veterans.

"(The Buddy Check) was instituted to be able to find veterans that are having problems and maybe need some assistance that we can help them with," Post 113 Chaplain and First Vice Commander Dan Pruett said. "We want to call and be able to see that everything's OK. Most of the interactions we have with them is they're doing fine, and that's great. Occasionally we get someone that needs help, and we certainly have the resources to be able to help them.

"To me, as a veteran that has had a lot of (health) problems ... there was a time when I needed something. I was glad to see (The American Legion) reached out and they were so good. They would do anything to help me. And so, it means a lot to me to be able to return that to these people we call."

Chinese fighter jet nearly collides with US bomber over South China Sea

A Chinese fighter jet flew within 10 feet of a U.S. bomber over the South China Sea on Tuesday, an "unsafe and "unprofessional" maneuver made all the riskier because it happened at night, U.S. Indo-Pacific Command said in a news release Thursday.

The pilot of the J-11 fighter executed the "unsafe intercept" with a U.S. Air Force B-52 Stratofortress that was conducting routine operations in international airspace over the South China Sea, according to the release.

"During the nighttime intercept, the [Chinese] pilot flew in an unsafe and unprofessional manner, demonstrated poor airmanship by closing with uncontrolled excessive speed, flying below, in front of, and within 10 feet of the B-52, putting both aircraft in danger of collision," the release said.

In such darkness and low visibility, it is possible the Chinese pilot could not assess how near his aircraft was to the bomber, according to the release. "We are concerned this pilot was unaware of how close he came to causing a collision," INDOPACOM said.

The flight route taken by the B-52 was not included in the release, but an undisclosed number of Stratofortresses deployed within the past week to Guam for a routine bomber task force mission.

Tuesday's intercept was conducted "in a manner contrary to international air safety rules and norms," the release said. "Military aircraft, when intentionally approaching another, shall operate with professional airmanship and give due regard for the safety of other aircraft."

The near miss is the latest in a sharp increase in risky behavior by Chinese pilots in the South China Sea, over which Beijing maintains broad claims of sovereignty that are disputed by neighboring nations.

On Oct. 17, the Pentagon released declassified images and videos depicting some of the roughly 180 incidents involving reckless maneuvers by Chinese pilots over the past two years.

"All [this is to try] to interfere in the ability of U.S. forces to operate safely in places where we and every country in the world have every right to be under international law," Ely Ratner, the Pentagon's assistant secretary of defense for Indo-Pacific security affairs, told reporters.

In response to the Pentagon's disclosures, China's Ministry of National Defense on Wednesday released video purporting to show the U.S. Navy guided-missile destroyer USS Ralph Johnson diverting its course to cross in front of a Chinese warship in the South China Sea on Aug. 19.

"This video proves that it is the US side that is making provocations, taking risks and muddling the water," Senior Col. Wu Qian, spokesperson for the defense ministry, said at a news conference in Beijing.

"We have much similar video evidence, but I won't show them today because of time constraints," he said. INDOPACOM said in its release that the U.S. will continue to "fly, sail, and operate — safely and responsibly — wherever international laws allow."

"The U.S. Indo-Pacific Command Joint Force remains dedicated to a free and open Indo-Pacific region, and we expect all countries in the Indo-Pacific to operate in international airspace safely and in accordance with international law," the release said.
