MCON meshes military culture, festive celebration

The American Legion is a founding partner of MCON, which debuts over Veterans Day weekend in Las Vegas.

Just what is MCON?

It's a bit of Comicon, Shot Show and military culture all wrapped up into a festival-like atmosphere that brings the military community together for an epic celebration. <u>The first</u> <u>MCON</u> will be held Nov. 10-12 at the Expo World Market Center in Las Vegas.

American Legion member Waco Hoover is among the founders of MCON. Hoover oversees the strategy for the Be the One initiative, which will have a prominent spot at the event.

"This is the start of creating something that will be the pre-eminent event celebrating military culture each year," Hoover says. "It's really exciting to merge the legacy of a 104-year-old organization with the promise of creating something to engage the younger generation of America's veterans."

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Each day will feature various speakers, physical activities, and other experiences for today's veterans, servicemembers and their families. One session will feature a panel discussion focused on The American Legion's <u>Be the One mission</u> to reduce the number of veterans who die by suicide.

Other scheduled speakers include:

- Chris Earl, a Marine Corps veteran, and CEO of Regiment Gaming will give a presentation on gaming, community, and mental health.
- American Legion Be the One podcast host and Marine Corps veteran Amy Forsythe and Army veteran Phyllis Wilson, president of the Women's Military Memorial, will discuss "Women at War: Why it Matters."
- Sebastian Junger, author of "Tribe" and an award-winning documentary filmmaker, will give a presentation entitled "Coming Back from War."
- Dr. Tiffany Tajiri, Air Force veteran and founder of Freedom Rhythm, will discuss emerging research and findings in human performance with epigenetics.
- A presentation on therapeutics features Red-Dot CEO Michal Bumann; Dr. Mark Seelig, a lead therapist trainer at the Usona Institute and Transcend Therapeutics; and Coast Guard veteran Ryan Scalmanini. They will discuss how veterans and first responder psychedelic medicine groups are creating communities.

As you read last week, the national organization has a new monthly, printable newsletter, called *The Millennium*. The first edition was sent out as part of an email with related SAL information. If you have not received *The Millennium*, you can view it <u>here</u>.

In order for this new publication to be successful, it will take work from a lot of people, including national elected and appointed officers, as well as commission and committee chairmen. Here is the schedule that has been requested for information to be submitted:

The national commander will have the opportunity to contribute as often or infrequently as desired. The commander's schedule may dictate when reports can be made.

National vice-commanders will report as follows:

- Northeast each September and March
- Western each October and April
- Midwest each November and May
- Southeastern each December and June
- Central each January and July

Commissions and committees will make reports in opposite months throughout the administrative year, with commissions reporting in odd months, and committees in even months.

Subcommittees, ad hoc committees, and special committees will report at least two (2) times per administrative year at their convenience and as information warrants.

The national adjutant, national chaplain, national historian, national sergeant-at-arms, national parliamentarian, etc. will report at least two (2) times per administrative year at their convenience and as information warrants.

All submissions mut be received by noon on the twentieth of each month.

Missouri Legionnaires make Be the One a regular occurrence during annual meetings

In the past few years, The American Legion Department of Missouri has provided suicide-prevention training during both its Fall and Spring Conferences, and its department convention. And momentum for the training has picked up as The American Legion has made its <u>Be the One</u> veteran suicide awareness program its top priority.

The department recently completed another round of training during its Fall Conference in Jefferson City, teaming with the Missouri Department of Mental Health's <u>Missouri Veterans Suicide Prevention</u> <u>Team</u> to do so.

Department of Missouri Adjutant Lowry Finley-Jackson was able to attend the training for the first time and came away impressed.

"It was really good," Finley-Jackson said of the training. "And at future conventions, instead of doing this as a stand-alone class, we're going to do it in front of the entire body. We're going to have (Missouri Department of Mental Health Veterans Services Director) Jon Sabala come out and do the training first thing in the morning on that Friday of the convention, so that anyone who is there will get the training."

Participants in the training are taught to recognize the warning signs of suicide, as well as how to offer help and get help for those who may be contemplating taking their own life. The training is open to the public, not just members of The American Legion.

But the training isn't just available to those who attend any of the department's three major meetings. "We offer (suicide-prevention) classes at each of our conferences and our convention," Finley-Jackson. "And then the guys from the Department of Mental Health will go out to American Legion posts ... and provide training there."

Finley-Jackson also noted the Missouri American Legion and other veteran service organizations, state agencies and the Missouri National Guard have teamed with the Missouri Department of Mental Health on Buddy Check 22 Day. Legislation was passed in the state in August 2020 establishing the 22nd day of each month as "Buddy Check 22 Day" to promote education and awareness of the problems of suicide facing military personnel.

And Finley-Jackson said Sabala has begun incorporating the Legion's Be the One program into his talking points during the training, "that the national American Legion is already on top of this with Be the One." And she feels that Missouri Legionnaires have become even more engaged in being proactive in suicide prevention since Be the One was launched.

"They want to prevent any suicide they can, they really do," she said. "We've had a few people within our department that have experienced it. They're leading the charge to get this done."

Peer-to-peer program helps Oklahoma post Be the One in its community


Oklahoma Legionnaire George Shafer has been in a dark place before, one so dark he contemplated taking his own life.

But he did not, and now the U.S. Army retiree is spreading the message of The American Legion's Be the One mission in his community through a new peer-support program.

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The chaplain at Lebron Post 58 in the small city of Guthrie, Shafer is heading up the post's peer-to-peer (P2P) support program that happens the first and third Monday of each month and could expand to even more often in 2024.

Shafer draws on his own experience when trying to help others who may be headed in the same direction as he once was.



"I'm a veteran with PTSD, and I suffered my own suicidal episode 10 years ago," Shafer said. "Thankfully, my wife came home, she found me. I spent two months in treatment. I've experienced the stigma and experienced the process of recovery. I'm now 10 years clean and sober, drugs and alcohol.

"I almost was one of the (daily veteran suicides). And that has been a passion of mine. Having the opportunity to pursue that passion is what really led me to my own participation (in Post 58's program)."

Shafer said the post already was looking for a way to implement Be the One into the post's programs. A meeting with the Legion's top officer at the time and then the election of a new one helped cement their plan.

"Collectively as the officers of the post, we had been putting our heads together to do something for our community to offset the national suicide rate," Shafer said. "For about three or four months we were in the planning stage trying to incorporate the national Be the One campaign. When Commander Troiola came into town, we were able to run it past him and got some input from him on it. And when (current National Commander Daniel J. Seehafer) took over, and he doubled down on Be the One, that's when we made the connection and said, 'OK, this is going to be around for a bit. Why don't we make this our post effort for the Be the One campaign?"

The first P2P session started in September. A committee oversees the P2P program, which has been attended by eight to 10 veterans on average. Shafer said all veterans are welcome, whether they are members of the post or not. The program is centered around peer-to-peer support, with Shafer serving as the moderator. "I will have a topic in mind," Shafer said. "We start off, we introduce one another, I say a little spiel about whatever was on my heart that week. And then from that point, the group takes it from there, and it goes off into some really personal stuff.

"Initially when we started the program, it was once a month. The consensus from the group was needed more often than once a month. We've gone to twice a month now, with hopes after the end of the calendar year to go to once a week.

Shafer said the P2P program has created a ripple within both the participants and the post. "The feedback for the individuals that participate in the group has been far greater than I anticipated," he said. "And it has sparked a fire in a lot of our members. We've gotten tons of input and tons of interest. It's been a passion project for our officers and our members at our post."

Post 58 Adjutant Kim Vincent praised Shafer for his part in the program, saying, "George is an asset to our post, and we are very fortunate and blessed to have his expertise and experience in this area."

Larry Taylor's daring Cobra rescue, convention coverage and more in November magazine

- Vietnam War Army veteran Ralph Hill tells how his long-range reconnaissance patrol (LRP) team, surrounded by North Vietnamese forces, was saved from certain death by Cobra helicopter pilot Larry Taylor the night of June 18, 1968. In September, Taylor received the Medal of Honor for his daring rescue, and is the third recipient of the nation's most prestigious military decoration from American Legion Post 14 in Chattanooga, Tenn. "He's always had a kind of 'aw shucks' attitude about it, but what he did was above and beyond the call of duty, and certainly at the risk of his own life," Hill says.
- In "Tested," Steve Beynon explains how declining academic performance nationwide is adding to the military's difficulty filling the ranks. "Roughly a decade ago, two-thirds of applicants could pass the ASVAB; now it's about one-third," he writes. "With the Army, roughly 70% of all applicants drop out of the enlistment process around the time they take a practice ASVAB, service data shows."

• Winning his second INDYCAR championship in three years, Chip Ganassi Racing's Alex Palou is proud to race for a cause with The American Legion and its Be the One mission. "I think we're raising awareness of the issue (of veteran suicide)," says Palou, who drove the No. 10 American

Legion Honda in 12 races. "It all starts by asking our veterans if they need help. You can be the one to save a veteran's life today."

VA launches \$1 million AI tech competition to reduce health-care worker burnout

The Department of Veterans Affairs has launched an Artificial Intelligence Tech Sprint encouraging innovators across America to create AI-enabled tools to reduce burnout among health-care workers. The winning solutions will help clinicians take notes during medical appointments and/or integrate patients' medical records, with the winning teams receiving \$1 million in total prizes.



Al Tech Sprint for Documenting VA Clinical Encounters and Integrating Community Care Data Collaborate to enhance patient experience and reduce healthcare worker burden via Al tools





Reducing burnout among health care workers is a top priority for VA, especially at a time when VA is delivering more care and more benefits to more Veterans than ever before. This effort is a part of <u>President</u> <u>Biden's new executive order on Safe, Secure, and</u> <u>Trustworthy Artificial Intelligence</u> and VA's efforts to use <u>trustworthy AI solutions</u> to improve health care and benefits for veterans, their families, caregivers, and survivors.

"AI solutions can help us reduce the time that clinicians spend on non-clinical work, which will get our teams doing more of what they love most: caring for Veterans," said VA Under Secretary for Health Shereef Elnahal. "This effort will reduce burnout among our clinicians and improve veteran health care at the same time."

This sprint is just one aspect of VA's comprehensive efforts to reduce burnout among health care workers. Last year, VA launched the <u>Reduce Employee Burnout</u> and Optimize Organizational Thriving (REBOOT) initiative to address major factors contributing to burnout and to promote wellbeing among employees. Additionally, VA is hiring employees at <u>record rates</u> to ensure that health care workers have the support they need. These efforts have led to a 20% decrease in turnover rate among Veterans Health Administration employees from 2022 to 2023.

Proposals for the AI Tech Sprint should seek to address one or more of the two focus areas: speech-totext solutions for use in medical appointments, and document processing to reduce the time needed to integrate non-VA medical records into patients' VA record.

Seager adds 2nd World Series MVP to trophy case The American Legion | November 2, 2023

Corey Seager's timely hits earned him World Series MVP honors as the Texas Rangers won their first championship — and put him in some rare territory when it comes to American Legion Baseball alumni.

Seager became just the third World Series MVP — and first since 1968 — to win that award in the same year he was recognized as <u>American Legion Baseball Graduate of the Year</u>. Seager, who played American Legion Baseball for Post 115 in Kannapolis, N.C., officially <u>received</u> the Graduate of the Year Award before the Rangers' game against the Los Angeles Angels on Aug. 16. That was the day after League City (Texas) Post 554 <u>became the first team from Texas</u> to ever win the American Legion World Series.

Most of that League City team was <u>also on hand</u> for what turned out to be the Rangers' only loss of the 2023 World Series, a 9-1 Arizona Diamondbacks victory.

Seager joins Frank Robinson (Post 237/Pleasanton, Calif.) and Mickey Lolich (Post 102/Portland, Ore.) as major leaguers to win Graduate of the Year and World Series MVP in the same calendar year. Robinson was World Series MVP in 1966 as he led Baltimore to a sweep of the Dodgers, while Lolich was World Series MVP in 1968 as the last pitcher with three complete games in a World Series, helping Detroit rally from a 3-1 series deficit to win the title.

Each year The American Legion honors a former American Legion Baseball player who is currently playing in the Major Leagues for his character, leadership, playing abilities and community service. Individuals are recommended by their respective posts.

This is Seager's second World Series MVP after winning it with the Los Angeles Dodgers in 2020. He's just the fourth player to win multiple World Series MVP awards and just the second to do so with different teams.

Hall of Famers Sandy Koufax, Bob Gibson and Reggie Jackson also each won two World Series MVP awards — Koufax with the Dodgers in 1963 and 1965, Gibson with the Cardinals in 1964 and 1967, and Jackson with the A's in 1973 and the Yankees in 1977.

Gibson (Omaha, Neb.) and Jackson (Pennsylvania) also played Legion Baseball.

Seager finished the 2023 World Series batting .286 (6-of-21) with three home runs, a double, three walks, six RBIs and six runs scored. His two-run home run in the bottom of the ninth inning tied Game 1, which Texas went on to win in extra innings, and he hit another two-run homer in the Rangers' 3-1 win in Game 3.

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And in the Game 5 clincher, Seager broke up Zac Gallen's no-hitter with a leadoff single in the seventh inning and scored the game's first run on a single by Mitch Garver as Texas closed out the series with a 5-0 win.

Seager is also a Gold Glove Award finalist; those winners will be announced Nov. 5. He's also a Silver Slugger Award finalist; winners will be announced Nov. 9.

Air Force looking to clinch Commander-in-Chief's Trophy

Rarely does a college football game in the middle of the season mean everything, but Saturday's contest between the Air Force and Army is an exception.

A victory by Air Force in the matchup at Empower Field at Mile High (2:30 p.m. ET, CBS Sports Network) would secure a second consecutive Commander-In-Chief's (CIC) Trophy for the Falcons (8-0 and ranked 17th in both the USA Today coaches' poll and the Associated Press media poll), who defeated Navy 17-6 on Oct. 21.

A win by Army (2-6) would put the Black Knights in position to claim the trophy for the next year, if they can also defeat Navy on Dec. 9. In the event of a threeway tie, the Air Force would retain the trophy.

Since the CIC Trophy was created in 1972, the Air Force has won it 21 times, followed by Navy (16) and Army (9). There have been 5 ties.

The game was scheduled for the Denver facility instead of Falcons Stadium in Colorado Springs, which is undergoing renovation with seating now limited to about 38,000 fans.

If the Air Force can run the table, the Falcons would be the first service academy team to go undefeated since the 1949 squad from West Point that went 9-0.

"These games against the (other) service academies are just so intense," said Air Force head coach Troy Calhoun, now in his 17th year leading the Falcons. "Because we use similar offenses, they tend to be really close games. So, there's some things in practice we try to resemble – where guys align, certain route combinations. But there are other things, like certain moves they may have as ball carriers, that you can't replicate. You have to see those things in a game to get a good sense of how they play. That's hard to produce in practice. "In a much bigger picture, I think the feelings of respect that comes to the forefront in these games is seen in why we have service academies. You don't get that feeling when you play anybody else."

If the Falcons win, it will probably be because of the run. The Falcons again have the top rushing attack in the country (300.4 yards per game) and the secondbest rushing defense, yielding only 65.8 ypg. Falcons' RB Emmanuel Michel leads the team with 696 rushing yards and nine rushing TDs.



The grind-it-out running game has also helped Air Force to top the nation in time of possession -34:31 per game. Senior quarterback Zac Larrier has combined cool, poised leadership with balanced and accurate athleticism (533 yards rushing, 651 yards passing) to direct the Falcons' attack.

"In the last few years, they've changed some rules (primarily about cut blocking)," Calhoun said, "so we altered our approach. For a long time, we relied heavily on zone runs, interior gap-blocking schemes, so it's made us change some things on the perimeter. Army's really, really talented. You look at their skill positions and see how many points they scored at San Antonio (a 37-29 Army win over UTSA on Sept. 15) against a really, really strong program there, that's quite the indicator. They had the lead against Boston College and Syracuse at the Dome, well, that just shows you how capable they are."

Army is rebuilding and has placed a greater emphasis on passing (averaging 132.6 ypg) and using a shotgun alignment than in the past. In last week's 21-14 loss to Massachusetts, the Black Knights started four freshmen on offense: quarterback Champ Harris, fullback Kayne Udoh (who has rushed for 308 yards over the last 3 games), center Brady Small and wide receiver Tobi Olawole. "It's a great rivalry and it's always been a really tough fight," said Army head coach Jeff Monken. "Going back to 2016, they've been really close football games – mostly one-score games. Every one of these academy games are like that – close, hard-fought battles.

"Air Force is a great football team. They're just so impressive with how well they run the ball and how well they stop the run. They have a lot of good senior players and that's what they do – they find a way to win. Our players are fired up, their players are fired up and that's what makes it such a great rivalry. We're going to have to play really well and minimize our mistakes if we're going to give ourselves a chance to win."

ALWS champs share love of baseball with Dallas youth

Noah Ferraro has worked at baseball camps before. But for him and his teammates from the 2023 American Legion World Series champions, their participation in a Play Ball event in Dallas on Oct. 28 was a special experience.

"I remember when I was a kid, I didn't really have these events," Ferraro said. "Baseball is a beautiful sport; I wish I had it when I was their age. I think it's really beneficial to them."

The ALWS champs from League City (Tex.) Post 554 and others, including several former major league players, visited the Texas Rangers Youth Academy to work with a group of seven- to 10-year-olds from around the area. The <u>Play Ball</u> clinic is aimed at increasing participation in baseball.

"Mostly just been having fun (with the kids), playing some T-ball, but I think they're starting to understand the fact that they need to hustle, above all else that's what it is," Ferraro said. "I think we're teaching hustle and heart; I think that's a good thing to learn."

"I've been walking around watching the boys and they're interacting with the younger kids; it's something for them to give back to the community and letting them work with kids younger than them and having that knowledge to pass on. It's great, I love it. Enjoying everything I'm seeing in there," said League City coach Ronnie Oliver.

In addition to the Post 554 players, those helping with the clinic included other youth baseball players and former major leaguers Nick Swisher, Dexter Fowler, Michael Bourn, Dellin Betances and Derek Holland, as well as former softball star Jennie Finch.

With the event taking place in Texas in conjunction with the World Series, the experience took on added importance to the Post 554 team.

"I think it's really beneficial to show everybody how we run here in Texas. We care about others, we love each other. I think that gets overshadowed a lot," Ferraro said. "I'm glad we can show people we support each other very much."


A handful of players were unable to make the trip because of college baseball obligations. But those who were able to come appreciated the opportunity to reunite.

"It's been real good the last day and a half that these boys have been able to get back together, rehash a little bit of what went on and enjoy each other's company. One thing we really like and develop in our program is, 10 years from now, 20 years from now, these boys will be together ... they become friends for life, and it shows," Oliver said.

The team rode a bus from League City to their hotel in Arlington on Friday, an experience Ferraro appreciated.

"It's just so calm and chill; we don't even have to talk to each other. We're all together. ... We've got each other's back no matter what," he said.

The team also attended Saturday night's Game 2 of the World Series as guests of Major League Baseball and were recognized on the scoreboard after the sixth inning of Arizona's 9-1 win over the Texas Rangers.

U.S. military bases throughout the Middle East continue to see drone and missile attacks from militant groups. Since Oct. 17, there have been 16 missile or drone attacks on American bases -12 in Iraq and 4 in Syria, where U.S. and coalition forces are fighting terrorist groups such as the Islamic State, Ryder said. The number of attacks was 13 on Tuesday.

One of the latest attacks occurred Thursday at an air base in Erbil in northern Iraq. Ryder said the attack caused no injuries and no significant property damage.

The Pentagon has not identified the groups behind the attacks but has said the militants are supported by Iran and are effectively Iranian proxy groups. The attacks caused almost two dozen injuries in the two countries, Ryder said, including 15 who received some form of traumatic brain injury.

"In all cases, members returned to duty," he said.



Task Force Movement: more than a job program November 1, 2023

Dear American Legion Family members and friends,

For many years, The American Legion has worked to help transitioning military personnel convert their ex-



personnel convert their experiences in uniform into credits to help them move quickly and effectively into civilian careers that require special licenses and credentials.

Many of those civilian careers are in serious need of qualified professionals. That need grew painfully clear during the COVID-19 pandemic, especially in such areas as commercial truck driving and nursing.

The American Legion is proud to have a place on the steering committee of <u>Task Force Movement</u>, a White House initiative that unites key stakeholders from industry, education, labor, government and the military to help our nation fulfill two key objectives:

- Get the U.S. economy rolling again in areas of need that, if not adequately staffed, pose national security and public health threats.
- Help transitioning military personnel and veterans get into career fields that make the most of their training and can put them in jobs that pay well, offer good benefits, and fulfill important purposes, all of which contribute substantially to good mental health and well-being.

Last August, during the 104th American Legion National Convention in Charlotte, N.C., <u>the committee</u> <u>met and announced an important new area of empha-</u> <u>sis – health care.</u> Look for new developments on that front in the months ahead. Task Force Movement was launched in April 2022 to speed up and ease the process for veterans to work in the commercial trucking industry, which now has some 80,000 vacancies. Five months later, <u>TFM added cybersecurity to its tar-</u><u>geted industries</u>, where some 70,000 jobs are available in government and perhaps 10 times that in the private sector.

The program proved successful in its first year, providing scholarships, apprenticeships and education waivers for veterans who had already proven their skills while in uniform. It's no easy endeavor to make this happen because different states and different industries in those states have different requirements to achieve certification. TFM has been working tirelessly with multiple stakeholders to break down barriers for veterans who are ready now to step into these careers in an economy starved for well-trained and capable employees who care about fulfilling important needs in the nation they swore with their lives to protect and defend.

By adding health care to its portfolio, TFM addresses a need The American Legion has listed among its highest priorities for the Department of Veterans Affairs over the last decade – recruiting and retaining qualified health-care professionals, particularly nurses. The shortage of health-care professionals in the nation right now is estimated at nearly 2 million, so everyone in that industry is competing for talent, more of which is desperately needed.

To keep making progress, TFM looks to continue building its roster of partners from industry, government, education, charitable foundations that want to support the initiative and the veterans community. Online registration forms to get involved are available on the TFM website at <u>taskforcemovement.org</u>.

Most important, all stakeholders – including The American Legion – have a responsibility to close these labor gaps because understaffed hospitals, idled trucks and online vulnerabilities do not simply represent economic inconvenience; they threaten our national security.

Legion, Coast Guard clean up after hurricane

During the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Waesche's visit to Puerto Vallarta, Mexico, 50 members of its crew and members of the local American Legion Post 12 conducted clean-up efforts at a park on Oct. 17. The cleanup included removal of trash, debris and fallen trees

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caused by the aftermath of Hurricane Lidia, which made landfall less than a week earlier.



"I asked (Capt. Robert Mohr of the USCGC Waesche) if he could spare 10 to 12 volunteers to help with the Hurricane Lidia clean-up effort," said Post 12 Commander Jesse Cole Rivera. "Twelve hours later he emailed me back that 50-plus crew members of the USCGC Waesche had volunteered to take part in the humanitarian mission I was organizing, and that they would be ready to go almost immediately after arriving in port."

Rivera coordinated transportation needs for the Coastguardsmen from the ship to the park, and he and his wife, Liliana, put together bags of snacks for the volunteers. Following the clean-up, Post 12 hosted dinner for the Waesche crew at a local Irish pub.

"Waesche's crew appreciated the opportunity to support a community that frequently hosts U.S. Coast Guard (ships) for port breaks during patrols," said Mohr to the Banderas News. "We heard about the impacts from Hurricane Lidia, and the crew was extremely eager to lend a helping hand. I would also like to thank The American Legion and the City of Puerto Vallarta representatives who made us feel very welcome throughout our stay in Puerto Vallarta."

Mohr and several of the Coastguardsmen gave Legionnaires a tour of the Waesche. Afterward, Rivera organized a game of volleyball between the captain and his crew, as well as with other sailors and Marines stationed at the Mexican Navy's 12th Naval Zone. "Playing volleyball has become somewhat of a tradition when our ships make port here," Rivera said. "Our post started the tradition a few months ago, and the folks on the ship and at the base always seem to enjoy it, so we intend to keep that tradition going. But don't ask me who won!"

Senate confirms 1st female leader of Navy, new Air Force top general and Marine Corps 2nd-in-command

The Senate on Thursday voted to confirm the first woman to lead the Navy and serve on the Joint Chiefs of Staff, a new top general for the Air Force and an assistant Marine Corps commandant as anger intensified over <u>a Republican senator's monthslong hold on military promotions</u>.

Adm. Lisa Franchetti was approved as chief of naval operations in a 95-1 vote after serving in the position for months on an acting basis while also performing the duties of her former role as vice chief. Sen. Roger Marshall, R-Kan., a former Army captain, was the only senator to oppose Franchetti's promotion.

"At every step of her career, Admiral Franchetti has been a trailblazer and a team builder who focuses on the mission, leads by example and gets the job done," said Sen. Jack Reed, D-R.I., the chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee. "She is an inspiration to many and someone who will always put the security of our nation, and all who defend it, first."

Her historic appointment marked the second time since February that the Senate has individually confirmed senior military nominees affected by a ninemonth hold on appointments and promotions by Sen. Tommy Tuberville, R-Ala.

Gen. David Allvin was approved as Air Force chief of staff in a 95-1 vote, with Marshall again voting no. Allvin also had been serving a dual role of acting chief of staff of the service as well as vice chief due to the logjam created by Tuberville's hold. Allvin's predecessor, <u>Gen. Charles "CQ" Brown, was promoted to chair-</u> <u>man of the Joint Chiefs</u> in September.

Senators unanimously voted, 86-o, to approve Lt. Gen. Christopher Mahoney for promotion to four-star general and appointment as Marine Corps assistant commandant. He was nominated for the service's secondhighest job in July.

The promotion of the three senior officers took on new urgency this week after <u>Gen. Eric Smith, the Marine</u> <u>Corps commandant, reportedly suffered a cardiac arrest</u> on Sunday. Tuberville's hold, an act of protest against the Pentagon's abortion access policy, had left the service's second-in-command position empty. Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., said Smith's hospitalization coupled with Israel's war in Gaza has created a crisis. He long resisted holding individual votes on nominees, which are normally approved in large batches, but made an exception in September to fill three seats on the Joint Chiefs.

He again moved to break with standard procedure this week after Tuberville and other Republicans tried to force floor votes on Mahoney, Franchetti and Allvin. "Patience is wearing thin on both sides of the aisle over the senator's actions," Schumer said Thursday.

Frustration with Tuberville's hold publicly spilled into the Republican ranks on Wednesday night as <u>several</u> <u>Republican senators attempted to bring forward the</u> <u>nominations</u> of 61 of the nearly 400 impacted officers. Each request was shot down by Tuberville, though he has repeatedly said he would not stand in the way of individual votes on nominees.

Tuberville offered no explanation for his refusals, visibly angering his fellow Republicans as they spent four hours attempting to break through the blockade.

"We have done the best we can to honor the request of a fellow senator that these nominations be brought to the floor and voted on individually," said Sen. Joni Ernst, R-Iowa, who is a retired Army officer. "I really respect men of their word. I do not respect men who do not honor their word."

Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., stormed off the Senate floor after confronting Tuberville over the extraordinary length of his hold and his decision to punish military personnel for a policy decision made by civilians. "No matter whether you believe it or not, Sen. Tuberville, this is doing great damage to our military," Graham said. "I don't say that lightly. I've been trying to work with you for nine months."

Republicans said they would return to the floor to put forward more nominees, but Democrats are pushing for a temporary resolution that would allow the chamber to group most military promotions into a single vote.

On Thursday, senators continued their attack on Tuberville's hold while voicing support for Franchetti, Allvin and Mahoney and vouching for their experience. "These are some of the finest leaders our nation has to offer, and America is stronger because of their service and their sacrifice," Reed said. Franchetti was commissioned into the Navy in 1985 and became a career surface warfare officer, commanding ships, squadrons, carrier strike groups and fleets. She served as commander of the U.S. Sixth Fleet from 2018 to 2020 and was appointed as the Navy's second highest-ranking officer in 2022.

She is only the second female four-star admiral in the Navy's nearly 250-year history.

"I know she'll continue her outstanding work as she breaks barriers for the Navy and for women everywhere," said Sen. Tom Carper, D-Del.

Allvin is taking over the Air Force's top position after helping lead the service's modernization as vice chief and serving with the Joint Chiefs as its director for strategy, plans and policy.

He graduated from the Air Force Academy in 1986 and has logged more than 4,600 flight hours as a command pilot, including 100 hours in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars.

"This is a gentleman, an officer, who has been in combat and who knows the rigors and demands of combat and like Admiral Franchetti, places his mission and his Air Force members ahead of any personal ambition," said Reed.

The confirmation of Franchetti and Allvin means all members of the Joint Chiefs are Senate-confirmed for the first time since the summer.



Mahoney's confirmation will allow him to step in to serve as Marine Corps commandant while Smith's health recovers. Mahoney previously served as deputy commandant for programs and resources and had racked up 5,000 hours of flight time as a Marine fighter pilot.

"He has led with distinction and with diligence and again, with selfless service to his Marines and to the nation," Reed said.
