Seehafer brings 'Be the One' to Maine in aftermath of shootings

The sign posted at the makeshift memorial in front of Schemengee's Bar and Grill in Lewiston, Maine, reflects what many in the community feel. "Fix the mental health system," was the message to a town reeling from a mass shooting on Oct. 25, which took 18 lives. Mental wellness has been a priority for The American Legion as well. National Commander Dan Seehafer leaned on his pastoral background while taking his "Be the One" message to the Department of Maine during a visit Nov. 3-4.

"God gave us two ears for listening," Seehafer said. "For me as an ordained minister, I do it all the time. We have office time. I have it with my members and people in need. We talk. Over 90 percent is listening. When people seek my counsel, they are the ones talking. By the time we are done with my little portion, they say, 'Pastor, I feel a lot better.' And I didn't even basically say a word. So, it's that listening."

Seehafer added his appreciation for Past National Commander Tony Jordan, who referred to him as "the right commander at the right time." It's a sentiment that was shared by many American Legion Family members who met Seehafer during his visits to six different posts in the Pine Tree State.

"I think it's critical that we show family support," added American Legion Auxiliary National President Lisa Williamson, who accompanied Seehafer on some of the post visits. "We know the individual who did these atrocious crimes had some mental health issues and the Legion Family – that's the Legion, the Auxiliary, and the Sons of the American Legion – firmly believe in our Be the One mission. And that mission is to destignatize mental health. It's been a taboo subject for far too long."

Matt Jabaut is a Lewiston native and The American Legion National Membership & Post Activities Commission Chairman. "I'm lucky in the fact that I have lots of different families and the Legion obviously being a primary one. Some of the first messages I got were from Legion Family members, who were messaging me and saying 'Hey, are you all right?' They know that I'm from Lewiston, that I live in Lewiston, went to Lewiston High School. It's a big part of my community."

Post 153 in Auburn hosted Seehafer for breakfast Saturday. The post is just a few miles from where the shootings occurred. Paul L'Heureux, a member of the post, described the tight-knit community. "When this came about," he said, "nobody knew who the victims were in the beginning. Within the next eight hours after the event, some of the names started to surface. It became apparent that as large as we thought we were here, we weren't. Your thought process became we are not that big. We are a community of one."

Department of Maine Adjutant Jason Hall also noted the small town feel that permeates the state and the impact that such a massive crime has on its residents. "In Maine, every town is a rural town. We're all close knit. Most parts of the country are six degrees away from separation. Maine is two degrees from separation. It almost affected every person in Maine. We either played softball with that person or it was our hairdresser's brother. It was a schoolteacher's aide from your high school. It was somehow connected to every person in Maine."

The power of Be the One

The American Legion has a mission from the post to the national level to end veteran suicide and destigmatize the need to ask for mental help. That mission is Be the One.

The American Legion is calling on everyone to Be the One to save the life of a veteran. And the Department of Arizona American Legion Family is answering that call

During its fall conference in Oro Valley, Ariz., Nov. 4, the department held a Be the One walk as well as a fireside chat with National Security Commission Chairman Matt Shuman and National Executive Director/Chief Marketing Officer Dean Kessel to learn more about Be the One and how everyone can save a life.

At 6 a.m., around 25 Arizona members of the Legion, Sons of The American Legion, Auxiliary and Legion Riders gathered outside the El Conquistador Hotel to walk in support of Be the One and show the community of Oro Valley how they too can be a part of the mission to save lives.

"We are trying to push this out into the community because the reality is anybody, anybody can check in

on a veteran," Shuman said. "If we can better educate the community that anyone can be the one to call a veteran, call a friend, check in on them, invite them to an event, see how they're doing, what we like to call a Buddy Check at The American Legion ... that's how all of us singlehandedly will put an end to this pandemic of veteran suicide."

Department of Arizona Commander Steve Sperl walked alongside the Be the One flag that led the walk. He said, "Be the One is as simple as just being there, answering the phone, saying hello, inviting them in for a conversation." And he gave an example. Recently while at work as a government civilian at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base in Tucson, "I noticed a young man didn't answer me the way he normally does. I invited him into my office and asked him what was wrong." Sperl then connected the veteran to a counselor within the squadron "and got him on the right path to talk about what's going on with him."

The Legion Family members walking made a stop at a coffee shop to share more camaraderie and their why to joining the Be the One walk. Jennifer Kritzer, a member of Post 29 in Phoenix, joined the walk to bring awareness to Be the One but also because the mission is personal.

"I lost my brother to suicide. So (Be the One) comes very personal to me," she said. "So, I want to be the one who makes a difference in somebody else's life. I don't want any family to ever have to experience what my family has gone through."

It's personal for Sperl too and why Be the One is at the forefront of his efforts leading as department commander.

"I've deployed several times to good and bad places during my military career, and I was honored to bring everybody home from those deployments. But what I couldn't do is take care of them when they got home. And I lost two of my close friends due to suicide. So that's what it means to me to lead this organization from the heart."

After the coffee and walk, Legion Family members attending the fall conference gathered for a brief presentation on Be the One from Kessel and the fireside chat. Kessel opened with a statement to the audience that "I believe in my heart that there's no organization in this country that is better positioned to do this (end veteran suicide) because of our reach at the local level and our voice at the national level. That's the power of this organization and the power of people in this room."

The first question to Kessel from Shuman was why and how Be the One started.

With mental health and veteran suicide being an issue that veterans from the global war on terrorism face, "it's incumbent of the veterans in this room to solve that problem so they're in a better place for the next generation of Legionnaires," Kessel said. Kessel approached Dave Berkenfield, a retired U.S. Navy SEAL who serves as team manager for Chip Ganassi Racing's (CGR) Extreme E, because of the Legion's partnership with CGR about the Legion's vision to end veteran suicide. But he had a question – how do you measure success?

"Dave doesn't mince words, ok," Kessel said, explaining that with paperwork in front of Berkenfield showing the Legion's vision and question on measuring metrics, "he took the papers on the desk, and he dropped them. He leaned into me ... he said, 'Dean, the only f***ing number that matters is one."

Soon after, Be the One became a mission.

"We want to talk about one ... talk about the one we saved today," Kessel said. "I don't have all the answers. The answers are in this room. That's how we solve this. It's not coming from national on down and spread out. It's going to come from somebody here." Additionally, Be the One is the project of American Legion national commanders now and moving forward, and Kessel is speaking with the Sons and Auxiliary on that same messaging. "Think about the power of the messaging, the power of our entire organization – well over 2 million people – working on this issue. We are going to make some things happen with that."

Shuman then asked if Be the One is working. To which Kessel replied, "yeah," and gave a powerful example.

During this year's INDYCAR race in St. Petersburg, Fla., the Legion had its Be the One mobile activation unit for veterans and family attending the race to visit. A young man in the Navy walked up asking for help. "Here was his headspace," Kessel said. "He was active duty, and he was getting ready to go back out for the 17th time and he said, 'I don't want to go. And the only way I don't go is if I'm not here."

The Legion service officer onsite found out the young man was from Jacksonville and loved to ride motorcycles. The service officer not only connected the Navy veteran to mental health services within the VA, but he is also now a member of a Legion Riders chapter in Jacksonville. "The Riders have wrapped their arms around this young man," Kessel said, adding that "we check on him twice a month through the VA. So, a pretty powerful day."

Chip Ganassi Racing won the race that day in St. Petersburg but not in the No. 10 Honda Be the One car that Alex Palou drove. But Kessel still called Chip Ganassi and said, "Congratulations on your race but I've got to tell you that we won twice today." And Kessel shared the story of a life saved.

Ganassi, the son of a World War II veteran, "got choked up. He said, 'Dean, I've never in my life had an opportunity to save somebody's life through a sponsorship.' He thanked me and us and is proud to be a partner with The American Legion. This man loves this organization and will do whatever it takes to help Be the One. That's the power of what we're doing."

Shuman then asked how every Legion Family member can Be the One.

Kessel emphasized the need to intervene before there is a crisis, before a veteran or loved one makes the 988 call.

"What can we do? Listen. Take notice," he said. "The biggest thing is loneliness. If somebody walks through your door at the post, make a beeline there to talk to them. Stop what you're doing and go say hello, welcome. When you are in the service, you're part of a tribe. When you come out of service you lose that to some extent. Talk to them because they want to be part of a tribe; they want to be part of a family. We are a Legion Family."

Shuman added that Legion Family members should call or visit a Legion member they haven't seen in a while to check in. "If somebody stops showing up to your post, figure out why."

Because as Kritzer said during the Be the One walk, suicide affects the whole family.

"Suicide is not just a veteran problem. It is a family problem," Kessel said. "It is a permanent solution to a temporary problem. That's what it is. I know people who weren't veterans. I've got a friend of mine who killed himself. He thought, 'my family is going to be better off. I am an anchor around this family.' But then all that does is you're transferring the pain from that person to the family when you do that. You're not releasing it; you're transferring.

"I've heard people talk about that The American Legion can be that second home. I think that's where our impact is.

"It is so powerful what's happening in our organization with what we want to do with this mission. I promise you there is nobody situated in this entire country to end this than the people in this room and The American Legion."

Impact Report: Buddy Checks go national

American Legion riders kick off 'Winter Stamping Tour'

How would you like to support our Veterans while patronizing businesses that you probably already frequent? Now you can.

American Legion Post 90 Cape Coral is part of a charity "Winter Stamping Tour" that started on Nov. 1 and runs until Feb. 28, 2024.

The American Legion Riders of Florida's District 13, of which Post 90 in Cape Coral is a part, includes 17 Legion Posts in Lee, Charlotte, Collier, Glades, and Hendry Counties. Legion Riders have visited businesses all over the area and signed them up to be a sponsor. For \$100 a business gets a coupon in a "stamp passport booklet." These booklets are available to Legion members and the public for \$10.

Money raised will be used to help American Legion Posts in Lee County that were severely damaged by hurricane Ian to repair and rebuild. Many Posts suffered storm damage, but four Posts, Fort Myers Beach, Port Charlotte, Sanibel/Captiva, and Bonita Springs had catastrophic damage.

The book includes 63 businesses who are participating. Anytime a person visits one of these businesses with their book, they can get it stamped. No purchase is necessary.

'Go beyond thanks:' New survey reveals we should do more than simply thank our veterans for their service

As the nation prepares to observe Veterans Day this year, USAA hopes to challenge the nation to go beyond simple gratitude to create real, positive impacts in the veteran community. A new survey sponsored by USAA reveals disparities between young military/veterans and their older counterparts in how they prefer to be recognized for their service. The survey was conducted by Endeavor Analytics and YouGov.

Of note, nearly 70% of younger military/veterans say they feel uncomfortable or awkward when someone says "Thank you for your service" to them. Conversely, only 24% of military/veterans aged 65+ say they feel uncomfortable or awkward when someone says the phrase to them.

"This data shows that military service members and our veterans want Americans to go beyond small talk to connect with them on a deeper level, including learning more about their service, honoring each veteran's service in ways in which they feel comfortable talking about it," said retired Army Maj. Gen. Robert F. Whittle, Jr., SVP, chief of staff at USAA.

In response to these findings, this Veterans Day, USAA is introducing a new campaign hosted at <u>USAA.com/veteransday</u> that encourages Americans to "Go Beyond Thanks" to honor our military and veterans by going beyond simple gratitude to create real, positive impacts in the community this holiday and every day.

This approach also encourages conversations about mental wellness, asking for help and veteran suicide prevention to break stigmas around such topics. USAA sees a connection between having such meaningful conversations and the veteran suicide prevention initiative <u>Face the Fight™</u> that USAA launched with founding partners Humana and Reach Resilience, an Endeavors Foundation.

The survey also found that older military/veterans are 76% more likely than the younger generation to connect with each other in person on the holiday, with younger military/veterans preferring to connect via social media.

"We know that personal connection is a critical component to mental health and suicide prevention," said Katy Dondanville, Psy.D., UT Health Science Center San Antonio. "Rather than simply offering our thanks, we should be looking for ways to go beyond small talk and create more meaningful connections with veterans and better understand their service."

USAA's goal is to make a positive impact in the veteran community and honor those who have dedicated themselves to the service of our country.

"We owe our veterans a debt of gratitude, but we also owe it to them to build a supportive community around them," said Wayne Peacock, USAA president and CEO. "And that community must find ways to have meaningful and tangible impacts on our veterans' lives. That's our duty, and it's why we are advocating for the public to go beyond traditional words of gratitude on Veterans Day."

This week, many Americans will see examples of social influencers that will "Go Beyond Thanks," including NFL player Aidan Hutchinson <u>@aidanhutch97</u>, gamer Stone Mountain <u>@stonemountain64</u>, and digital creator Ayumi Lashley <u>@ayumiofficial</u>. The survey also revealed 28% of civilian respondents do not know or are not sure why we celebrate Veterans Day. USAA believes there is an opportunity to educate the public on why we observe Veterans Day each year and inspire all Americans to check in with a veteran, as it can mean so much, especially if they are struggling.

USAA teams up with The American Legion to Go Beyond Thanks

USAA is also teaming up with The American Legion to "Go Beyond Thanks" by providing three Legion posts with new exercise equipment centers. As veterans increasingly connect and engage in conversations with fellow veterans through exercise in their quest to remain fit, USAA is providing this equipment at posts in Las Vegas, Noblesville, Ind., and San Antonio. The equipment is scheduled to be installed in the coming months.

"The American Legion posts are a place to serve and advocate for our veterans and the military community," said Waco Hoover, who is leading the Be the One platform for The American Legion. "A key goal of Be the One is to go further upstream than the point of crisis to identify solutions that will improve mental health and reduce veteran suicide. The installation of these exercise centers will enhance the experience of our veterans and further cement these posts as a place they can convene and remain physically and mentally healthy together."

Navy investigating 3rd possible suicide this year at Naval Base Kitsap

The Navy is investigating the death of a sailor whose body was found in his residence near Naval Base Kitsap in Washington, service officials said this week.

The death, which happened Oct. 22, has been ruled a suicide by the Kitsap County Medical Examiner's Office. If confirmed by the Navy, the sailor would be the third suicide at NB Kitsap this year.

The Defense Department reported last month that <u>suicide rates rose 3% between 2021 and 2022</u>, the latest statistics available.

The death of the sailor was confirmed in a statement from the USS Nimitz, an aircraft carrier on which the deceased sailor served as an aviation boatswains mate airman. The carrier's homeport is Naval Base Kitsap. It's currently at sea on a training exercise. Two other sailors from Kitsap who died this year were suicides, according to local law enforcement officials. The status of the Navy investigations of the previous cases were not available this week.

In April, a petty officer with Submarine Development Squadron 5 was found dead off the base in Silverdale, a town near the submarine base area at Kitsap. The Kitsap County Sheriff's Office determined the death was a suicide.

In January, <u>a sailor assigned to the aircraft carrier USS</u> Theodore Roosevelt was found dead in the enlisted quarters at the naval station. The Kitsap County Medical Examiner's Office determined suicide as the cause of death.

Two other USS Theodore Roosevelt crew members were previously reported as suicides during the ship's 18-month refurbishing at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard at Kitsap. The 37-year-old Nimitz-class carrier returned in March to its homeport of Naval Air Station North Island in San Diego.

The Department of Defense Annual Report on Suicide in the Military for 2022, which was released Oct. 26, showed the rate of suicides per 100,000 service members was up 3% from the prior year across all services and including active duty, reserve, and National Guard members.

While suicide rates fluctuated from year to year, the report found "suicide rates for all services gradually increased from 2011 to 2022."

The report said the military suicide rate is similar to the general U.S. population when adjusted for age and gender. Young, enlisted men in the military are the most vulnerable to suicide. Self-inflicted gunshot wounds are the leading method of suicide.

The report recorded 331 suicides among active-duty service members in 2022. The Marine Corps had the highest rate of suicides, at 34.9 per 100,000. The Army rate was 34.9, the Navy was 20.7 and the Air Force was 19.7. The Space Force reported no suicides in the period of the report.

The Nimitz statement issued Tuesday said the Navy is "here to support our shipmates and we encourage any sailor who is struggling to seek help and support. Chaplains, psychologists, counselors, and leaders are engaged with the crew and are available on board to provide appropriate support and counseling.
